

Planning Commission Member:

There will be a public hearing (Oct. 11th) concerning a proposed motorplex for GS Enterprises (Greg Sanford). As a neighbor directly across from this proposed drag strip I am opposed.

Mr. Sanford has a poor track record when it comes to working with his neighbors on the resolution of complaints. His performance in Scribner, Dodge County NE was poor and ultimately led to the failure of his racetrack there. Mr. Sanford believes the location was the problem or access but unfortunately the facts do not bear this up. He would not compromise with Dodge County to build a paved access road and this failure led to his decision to give up and move his ideas elsewhere. Well now he is here and the same lack of foresight came with him. He has not met with any of the neighbors. This proposal and this developer are both bad news.

The drag strip doesn't fit the comprehensive plan. This alone is enough reason to deny it. The drag strip will be loud. My family has a homeschool directly across from track. Any ordinance proposed should protect an existing homeschool, private schools and public schools from this type of noise. This noise is more akin to a rocket than just road noise from Hwy 77. One of my children has Down syndrome and he has very sensitive hearing and is affected by vibration. This proposal if approved would force me to move in order to protect my children's safety and education.

The other problems with this track-alcohol sales near my home, increased traffic, rubber burning and wafting over my property, sewage, and limited well water availability also concern me.

Proponents of the drag strip will say that it will be an economic boon for the county and area. Well just the opposite will occur. The area most affected will be farmland that would eventually turn into low density acreage development with build through design to allow greater density later. In the 2 mile area surrounding the drag strip there is the town of Davey (67 households) and 90 acreage home sites currently. If only one home per 20 acres was constructed on remaining land (15,000 acres) that would still leave room for 700 future home sites. Multiply by an average investment of \$250,000 and that would equal \$ 175 million in direct investment. That would turn into seven times that figure and those people will buy groceries, purchase insurance, buy cars, ride horses etc. If you develop property or realize the potential for the quiet acreage , Northern Lancaster County is a good place to live and a great place for builders in the future unless of course we throw the comprehensive plan out to reward someone who can't seem to make a go of it and wants money from the State to help him.

Please consider this proposal future downzoning for the north side of Lincoln and vote no to poor land use and development.

We are writing to express our strongly held opposition to the proposed dragstrip by Greg Sanford for the property on highway 77 just south of Davey Road. We attended the meeting where Sanford represented himself as simply wanting to do lots of grading, land mining on that piece of property. At that time we were very disappointed that his proposal was not recognized for what it really was, a request for approval to build a large and noisy car racing facility.

We moved to this area expressly to be close enough to Lincoln but far enough away to enjoy a quiet rural life. Subject Drag Strip Concerns

My husband and I live 1/2 mile from the corner of Hwy 77 and Davey Road. The proposed drag strip would pose definite problems for us.

1. Traffic congestion. This is already a busy stretch of highway. Weekend traffic for drag races would create congestion, pollution, traffic delays which could result in road rage incidents, plus the very real danger of additional traffic accidents.
2. Increased potential for DWI. We have already lost neighbors to crashes caused by drunk drivers. We don't want to run the risk of more tragedy.
3. Noise. We dread the thought of noise every weekend for so many months of the year. One of the reasons we live in the country is for the peaceful quiet surroundings.
4. Impact on property valuations. Unless someone is really into racing they would not be likely to pay full market value for our property when we decide to sell.
5. Mud on the highway. During the dirt mining phase trucks will track dirt onto the highway which will turn into mud when it rains. This is a traffic hazard which we have already experienced on Hwy 77 south of I-80.



Hi Mike,

This is Erin.....I talked to you before I bought LOBO Acres in May. That is now 1 mile from the proposed dragstrip.

I purchased what is a dream property for me and have been living there in the beauty and peace. Mine and many others' lives will be virtually ruined if this is approved. Please, please, I beg you, to please think of the people for the many miles surrounding it, that will no longer live in peace and not only that, but would never be able to sell their properties if this is built. That alone is not the only issue, but that is the most personal to me. The sound pollution, light pollution, habitat destruction, drunk drivers leaving the facility, and possible ground water contamination are also concerns. Sanford's claims that building this in a bowl will eliminate the sound pollution is just plain dishonest, just like this whole thing from the beginning. "Dirt mining"..... My friends' Aunt lives outside of Mansfield Ohio. They lived a peaceful rural life until a track was built a mile away. Like Sanford, they claimed because of the "arena" style of construction that no one would hear this. She says that it is horrible. Your letter which arrived in the mail today is both welcome and appreciated. We have been aware for some time of your desire to build a drag strip on your property adjacent to Hwy 77.

Mrs. Matson and I do not have an antipathy for drag strips per se. At the same time, we are distressed by the continuing replacement of our natural green for asphalt. I do know that there are justifiably many who have great enthusiasm for this event and who would enjoy having a place to participate.

One of our quarter sections is just one half mile south of the proposed strip. We are not in favor of a strip that close to our property. The highway is a very busy one and destined to become more so. Through actual knowledge and watching drag races on TV, we have some knowledge of the ancillary effects of such a strip on the general area of the strip. There are negative factors beyond control that can accompany a drag strip. These are in addition to the usual complaint of noise, traffic, lights, late hours, etc.

I understand there are those who recommend that a drag strip, if generated, could be well placed in the vicinity of the airport where there may already be paving available. With these things in mind, I must tell you that I will oppose a strip just one half mile from our property. I trust you may be instrumental in forming such a thing in a more approved area.


I am writing to respectfully ask that you take our concerns into consideration in regards to the application for County Special Permit No. 06051. We are property owners within 1 mile of the zoning request and are in opposition of the proposed drag strip to be placed between Branched Oak Road and Davey Road off of Highway 77. There are multitudes of concerns such as traffic, noise, property values, quality of life, environmental, and future growth of the city.

The house in which we reside was built in 1895 by Scott's great grandfather. We wanted to keep this part of history in the family that has been in the area for more than 100 years. We have made many improvements over the years to preserve the home and create a quiet, peaceful location with tall prairie grasses to attract and provide shelter for wildlife. Long time residents have commented on how proud Scott's great grandparents would be to see that we have chosen to salvage the house and create an environment that many would like to call home.

We have great concerns about the noise the proposed drag strip will create and the effect to property within a certain parameter. I understand that concrete barriers, earthen berms, trees and such can be used to try and break down the sound. I have doubts that this will maintain the noise to an acceptable level that people would expect when wanting to buy or live on an acreage in the county. On Friday, September 1st, there was car racing (sprint?) at the State Fair. We could hear the cars as they circled the track through our second story windows. The State Fair is approximately 13 miles from our house and you can imagine the amount of trees and building that should have helped to knock down the sound. The noise from the cars, PA system, and lighting that would be necessary for this type of operation would be extremely obtrusive to acreage living.

Subject SP06051 Dragstrip Opposition

Lancaster County Planning Commissioners,

I am adamantly opposed to application SP06051 submitted by Greg Sanford for the proposed drag strip facility at Hwy 77 between Davey and Branched Oak Roads for many reasons.

First, I am a local resident with 1.75 miles between my property and his. Research will tell you that I will be impacted by the noise from a drag strip that close to me. I left the conveniences of the city, things that you take for granted in your daily life, because the quiet of the country meant much more to me. My children did not grow up with cable and high speed internet to entertain themselves. Instead they learned to enjoy nature and play with the many animals we have. Sanford's camp says noise doesn't travel far and that is not true. All the berms in the world are not going to contain the noise from a 144 decibel dragster. Most importantly, what constitutes noise often boils down to perception. Burnouts every 60 seconds for 8-13 seconds of that minute from 8am to nightfall (such as we witnessed at the Topeka Kansas track he often references) will dramatically interfere with my right to peace and quiet. I always told my children that their privileges ended when it interfered with the basic rights of others. I work long hours during the week and look forward to the quiet of country living on the week-end when the drag strip would be very active.

The Hillcrest animal clinic sought a special permit this spring to build an equine facility nearby. The Stitches sent us a letter (long before we saw zoning signs or heard about it by other means) detailing their intent, complete with sitemaps and encouraging us to contact them with questions or concerns. Sanford does not follow that courteous example. In fact, neighbors within the 1 mile received the following letter from him this week. No detail, no reassurances or explanations of noise containment, and obviously done only to meet the requirement of notification which the grapevine did 9 months ago. *My name is Greg Sanford and I own the land on the east side of Hwy 77 between Branched Oak Road and Davey Road. I would like to visit with you to address any questions you may have regarding the described property. Feel free to contact me at anytime day or night at the phone numbers or email address listed below.*

One has to wonder about the character about the developer. Refer to his response in the application he filed. He marked "No" to the question "Have the neighbors been informed of your request?" One has to wonder why he doesn't have the integrity to face situations upfront. There have been 3 public meetings on the prior 'soil mining' applications for this land. We all know the underlying intent for that was preparation for a drag strip. Sanford was quoted in the August 31, 2006 edition of the Waverly New as saying his goal was to work with the people. He was quoted as saying "I want to communicate with them, I want this to be positive. I want to be a good neighbor". When does he want to start? I have not seen any proof of this yet. He knows who I am

and has yet to attempt to contact me. He does only what he is required to do. His management style to date does not give me confidence that he would be able to manage a drag strip in any ethical capacity. Review the comments made on his www.nemotorplex.com website, not even the drag strip enthusiasts have confidence that he is the right person to manage the drag strip based on their prior business dealings with him in Scribner. Speaking of ethics and his website, ask yourself a question. Why would my name, address, telephone number and a picture of my house to be posted on his site? Why did they list the names and addresses of all of us who spoke in opposition to the soil mining permit? While my personal information was removed (admission that it shouldn't have been there to begin with), the rest of the information has remained there since September 13th. Is that how he demonstrates good faith? Is good faith having his buddy post on the home page of www.lincolneedsadragstrip.com to have their side show up an hour early to keep the opposition out of the room?

Look at the application itself, where is the detail? Does it define the expected types of events? Are we talking 50 cars or 500 cars a week-end? How many small versus large events during the season? What is the season, April to November? How many spectators, 50, 500, 5000? How many events per year with top fuelers, the loudest of the bunch? The plan calls for parking for 600 and seating for 5,000. That will impact our ability to access Highway 77 potentially for 3 days a week, 9 months a year and is not fair to the local residents. How can a decision be rendered without sufficient information to make an informed decision?

On his last two visits to the planning commission, his attorney handed in amendments at the beginning of the meeting. On both occasions the items should have been included in the original application. Even more so for the second permit, because the *amendments were identical* for the second meeting. This constitutes nothing less than evasiveness on his part. Why not be upfront? Why not provide the opposition with a copy of these last minute amendments? His attorney gave us a copy, upon request, *after* the second meeting. I would ask that you allow our attorney to be provided with a copy of any last minute amendments at the same time they are provided to you on October 11th. Furthermore, if there are unanswered concerns on October 11th, delay your recommendations until you have sufficient information to address all concerns.



The purpose of my letter is to voice my opposition to the special use permit for the operation of a motorsports facility located between Branched Oak Road and Davey Road along the east side of Highway 77. I am primarily opposed because this proposed land use does not comport with current zoning regulations or adjacent land use in the area.

We live in a beautiful agriculturally productive area, consisting of farms and acreages, rich with abundant natural resources which is zoned AG. According to the Lancaster County Zoning Ordinances, land designated as AG is "for agricultural use and is intended to encourage a vigorous agricultural industry" The Comprehensive Plan for Lancaster County reveals that the subject area will remain AG well into the future at least 20-25 years. Approximately 90% of Mr. Sanford's 133-acre site is designated as "prime agricultural land" or "farmland of statewide importance," as defined by the U.S.D.A. Natural Resource Conservation Service. To allow something as obtrusive and environmentally desecrating as a drag strip to be located on prime ag land in the middle of a rural community is just as ludicrous as locating a hog confinement at 48th and O Streets. It just is not a good fit for this area. This is why we have zoning and a long-range comprehensive plan.

The proponents of Sanford's drag strip repeatedly compare his facility to a race track in Topeka, Kansas known as Heartland. Heartland is located in a commercially zoned area on 750 acres near an airfield. The surrounding areas consist primarily of an airport, industrial uses, airpark-type airbase housing and a few sporadic acreages to the rural side of the track. The commercial businesses consist primarily of a few liquor establishments with bars over the windows, strip joints, and low class restaurants. I do not want to see this happen to our neighborhood.

Back in 2004, at the request of Darl Naumann of the Mayor's Office on Economic Development, Lancaster County formed a "Motor Sports Task Force" for the purpose of locating a suitable commercial site to accommodate a motor sports facility. Mr. Naumann addressed the City Council on February 14, 2005 and stated: "...the density of houses in Lancaster County is amazing. This is no longer a rural community, but an urban one. Almost every section in the County has been used up..." What I believe he is saying by that comment is that there really is no place in Lancaster County that can comfortably accommodate a racetrack.

I respectfully request that you recommend denial of Mr. Sanford's application.





Our names are Carlyle and Carolyn Fitzke, and we reside at 17400 N. 84, Lincoln. This letter is in opposition to the proposed drag strip wishing to locate between Branched Oak Road and Davey Road, parallel to Highway 77.

Our concerns are numerous, and given the amount of attention this proposal has received, I am sure you are aware of all them. Those being primarily the noise issue, location, property values, environmental concerns, alcohol problems, traffic, etc. Any one of these issues is evidence enough to deny this permit, however there are a couple of things we would like you to consider.

- Our research into the noise issue involved discussions and input from individuals involved in the "science of sound" (noise). As it turns out, "sound" is directly affected by wind, humidity, temperature inversions, etc. Therefore the same "sound" would result in different decibel ratings on different days. This also is the case in instances where "noise controls" have been put in place (i.e. berms, trees, hollows, etc.) In our discussions with other individuals living in proximity (up to 5 miles) of a drag strip, we found this to be the case. "Some days it isn't too bad but other days you would think the cars were in your back yard", was a comment we heard frequently.
- "Noise" is a difficult term to describe. It cannot simply be defined by "decibel levels". Some sounds have high decibel ratings but are not unpleasant (orchestra music). Some may have low decibel ratings but are extremely irritating (fingernails on a blackboard). We place revving unmuffled engines, screeching tires and constant PA announcements in the "irritating" category
- Cass County in their Ag/Comm zoning regulations did not mention any decibel ratings. They included such items as:
 - "That the conditional use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purpose already permitted, not substantially diminish and impair property values within the areas of the County."

- “The use shall not include noise which are objectionable due to volume, frequency or beat unless muffled or otherwise controlled.”
- “The use shall not include vibration which is discernible without instruments on adjoining lot or property.”
- Even the proponents for the track recognize that the track **“could pose a problem for those that enjoy the peace and quiet of country living. This needs to be respected. No one wants this in their back yard.”** This was from a local view editorial written by Roger Nunn and appearing in the September 25, Lincoln Journal-Star.

Finally, we have heard the proponents comment that there are only 20-25 people who are opposed to this facility. Nothing could be further from the truth! We will present at the hearing a list of signatures of people opposed. Just about all of them residents within a 3 mile radius of the proposed track and including many Davey residents as well.





Dear Planning Commissioners,

I oppose this permit application for the following reasons:

1. The land is zone AG and Mr. Sanford wishes to build a Commercial/Industrial complex and pay only AG property taxes. His project does not fit the zone land use. It belongs in an existing Commercial/Industrial area where loud noise, light glare, crime and litter are already the standard, unlike our agricultural neighborhood.
2. The air, sound, light and water pollution will have a very detrimental effect on the current and future residents of the area. It will also disrupt wildlife patterns and make future housing development within several miles less desirable.
3. The traffic issues as spectators and crews would depart at night possibly as late as midnight or 1:00 am, with at least some being very tired or having consumed alcohol cannot be ignored. There have been several alcohol-related traffic deaths within two miles of the sight in the last few years, and the neighborhood is sensitive to this issue.
4. This application again is not forthcoming in my opinion. If it were to be approved, I would predict that soon after soil mining and removal would begin and the site could become a strip mine for 3, 6 9 or more years. The traffic problems and accident incidence are certain to increase.
5. This application is not about economic growth for Lincoln as it is portrayed, it is about economic growth for the owner. By investing some seed money, I predict he will soon be competing with clean and more desirable enterprises for grants, and public money for promotions, road paving and such.
6. It is my belief that this applicant's funds are very limited and he must rely not only on public grants, but out-of-state racing promoters to prop up his operation. I believe alcohol vendors/brewers/distributors will expect promotion and sales on the site and that he will soon apply for a permit and plead that he, "has to offer alcohol to make the business profitable".
7. The applicant is unwilling to put up a 2 million dollar bond to pay for damages to adjacent property, and property values. What does this say about his intent to be a responsible neighbor?
8. The applicant himself bought a home at about the same time he did the proposed site for his "World of Noise". Please note that his house is approximately 9 miles from the site. We have to live here.
9. He says the project will be an economic boon for Lincoln. It will fill the motels, restaurants, etc. He has said he would like to buy the Davey, NE bar and build a campground on his property. I predict he will also attempt to sell food and other products on-site as he will claim he must to "make a go of it". He will likely "short-stop" as much of the limited spending that he can. Lincoln and the rest of the county will receive little benefit from this boondoggle.
10. He has made grandiose claims of economic development, but has heretofore produced NO ECONOMIC STUDY OF THE IMPACT OF SUCH AN OPERATION ON LANCASTER COUNTY. It is my contention that his proposed project would have a negative impact after factoring in additional law enforcement costs, health and hospital costs, strain on fire and rescue services, litter clean up, road damage, responding to complaints of operating after hours and in a nuisance fashion, injuries and fatalities to humans and wildlife, noise, sound and light pollution of the air, water pollution of surface and

groundwater, soil contamination, loss of topsoil, displacement or creation of an undesirable establishment of "clean and compatible" businesses.

11. Nebraska already has racing related entertainment in Kearney, McCool Junction, Ashland—Greenwood, Hastings and elsewhere. Such an operation would take revenue away from smaller towns that need the revenue that would be relatively small to Lincoln.

12. Other "quiet and clean" enterprises are being planned and developed within a few miles of the proposed site that are in compliance with the zoning. A motor sports complex would make the area unattractive for most of these operations to develop and would likely drive away the owners of current operations. They include:

- a. bed and breakfast operations
- b. agri-tourism
visiting farms, orchards, wineries
- c. hunting leases
- d. wineries, vineyards and orchards
- e. a healing center
- f. an equine center
- g. a truck farm that serves the farmer's market.

13. Fire and Emergency services are spread thin with predominantly volunteer forces. His so-called on-site fire protection has little impact on alcohol fuel fires that can burn "invisibly" and go unnoticed until the jump Branched Oak road and flare up in the approx. 110 acres of native grasses and 100 acres of orchards, windbreaks and woodland forest.

14. Many wildlife and conservation groups have donated time, expertise and funds to develop the 210 acre site directly to the south as a wildlife, prairie and woodland conservatory. The groups are:

Pheasants Forever
Nebraska Game, Fish and Parks Commission
Bluebirds Across Nebraska
Lower Platte South Natural Resource district
Waverly farmer's Cooperative
United States Department of Agriculture
Nebraska Nut Growers Association
Lancaster County Farm Service Agency
Waschiska Audubon Society

I am certain that the leadership of these groups will raise their concerns regarding their investment if a permit is granted to build a combination drag strip, motocross, snowmobile, go-kart, tractor races, demolition derby and whatever other vehicles could be run, raced or revved on the site.

These are but a few of my concerns. I will address others at a later date. Please be wise, and use good judgement and planning in protecting this AG/AGR community. WE ARE A CLOSE-KNIT COMMUNITY OF FAMILY FARMS AND ACREAGES.

Hello,

I am writing to ask the County Board, and the Planning Commission to please deny the Special Use Permit sought by Greg Sanford to develop a drag racing track on a 133 acre tract along Hwy 77 from Davey to Branched Oak Road.

There are several reasons to deny this special use request.

- 1) This is in the middle of acreage and agricultural land. People LIVE within a mile of this area. What kind of environment are you leaving them with if this is developed? People move from the city to the country for a reason: peace and quiet. I live on an acreage SW of Lincoln, and if this was developed in my area, I would honestly quit my job and leave the state. What are you telling these people if you approve this? You are telling them that they do not matter. That a few landowners' quality of life does not matter in the big picture. These are your constituents. These are the people that you serve to protect. These people should NOT be disregarded. If the mayor of Lincoln thinks a Super Wal-Mart does not fit within the neighborhood setting of northeast Lincoln, how does a drag racing track fit within the acreage/agricultural setting? It DOES NOT.
- 2) Approval of this permit would lead to lawsuits from landowners and environmentalists in the area. This process has been flawed from the beginning. Greg Sanford was initially rejected for a special use permit. Then he applied for a "dirt mining" permit, and was granted that. Now, he has worked the system in a way that he can again apply for a special use permit, if the wording is changed in the recreational use zoning language. This process was dishonest from the beginning and opens the county to lawsuits from landowners. Not to mention the lawsuits that will be filed against the track owner for emotional distress, loss of land value, etc?
- 3) Why do we have zoning laws if we don't abide by them? If you re-work the language in the zoning and re-zone this area, you are telling landowners everywhere that they are not safe. That, even tho they may be zoned Ag, residential, or for acreages, anything can go in next door, as long as it's in the name of "economic development." This, again, is telling your constituents that they do not matter. The peace and quiet that EVERYONE deserves in a home can be ruined with something as loud and environmentally un-friendly as a drag racing track.
- 4) You will be killing development in this area of the county. Who will want to develop near this? Certainly not residential development. This will become a wasteland, with the only residential development being low-income housing because the land values will be so depreciated. So, the most unfortunate in our community will be subjected to this kind of noise and pollution because they have no other choice.
- 5) Noise and environmental factors are HUGE. This thing will be heard for miles. My sister used to live 1 mile from Sunset Speedway in Greenwood. She lived in Omaha. We could hear that track clear as day on Friday nites when they raced. And this was an area with houses and development between the track and her neighborhood. So, there were sound barriers, and it could STILL be heard. The track that is being proposed is out in the middle of the country. Sound travels for MILES out there with little or no barriers. I live on 3 acres and I can hear someone from 3 lots over cough on a clear nite. The people that live within a mile of this track will never be able to go outside when racing is going on. They will not be able to open their windows. They will hear it inside with their windows shut. They will smell it. They will breathe the exhaust from these vehicles. This will ruin their quality of life.
- 6) Is this the kind of "economic development" we want to bring to this county? More drunk drivers on the road? Environmentally un-friendly activities? Noise pollution? Who, exactly is going to benefit from this besides Greg Sanford? A few bars in the area? A few hotels? Will this bring jobs to Lincoln/Lancaster County? Will this add substantially to the tax base? Are we that

desperate in this county that we are encouraging a drag racing strip to come here and calling it economic development?

I beg of you. Please do not approve this special use permit. Please tell this citizens of Lancaster County that this kind of development, while possibly suited for another setting, is not suited for country living. Please protect these people that live in this area and work in the county and pay taxes. Please make a statement that "process" matters. That doing things in a shady manner will not be tolerated. Please tell the people of the county that zoning is there to protect them from things like this going in next door.

The people of Lancaster County are speaking to you. Please listen.

I would like to respond to some of the issues and statements you sent Mike Dekalb in an email dated 09/15/06. I am a property owner close to the proposed site. The first issue concerns the Kansas Speedway development. The Kansas Speedway is a Nascar Race track which has nothing to do with drag racing. This track has seating for 82,000 fans with future expansion to 150,000. It has parking for 65,000 vehicles. Mr. Sanford wants to compare his proposal with this track? Cabela's and Nebraska Furniture Mart building here had nothing to do with the track. They built here to have easy access from the interstate to draw people from the entire Kansas City area. This Speedway only has 4 major race events per year.

The next issue deals with the comparison of Heartland race track in Topeka. This track sits on 750 acres of land next to the airport. It was completed in 1989 at a cost of 22 million dollars. In 2006 dollars it would cost 37 million. It also has road coarse racing in addition to drag racing. This track is 35 miles from the Kansas City area and draws on this major metropolitan area for its support. The current population of the area is approximately 2 million residents. Using economic impact data from these tracks is beyond ridiculous. Let's now look at Mr. Sanford's proposal of approximately 2500 seats with parking for 600 cars with port-a- potties for restrooms. There are already similar tracks within this area such as Pacific Junction, Iowa and Kearney, Nebraska. Over saturation of a market means failure for all.

Let's also take a look at Mr. Sanford's management of his track at Scribner. I looked at archives of the Fremont Tribune from when Mr. Sanford first bought the track until it closed. When he first purchased this track his track manager made grand predictions as Sanford is now about the future of this track. From an article in the Tribune dated 4-20-2000 his track manager Wayne Lewis says "We'll have 10,000 seats. But we hope to expand to 50,000." This never happened. This is from another Fremont Tribune article dated 11-04-05:

Greg Sanford said his business is in a bind, and without special help from Dodge County and the Dodge County Convention and Visitors Bureau

This doesn't look too successful to me. In my opinion this track is only a small regional track with limited outside fan appeal.

The next question I would like to address is the likely effects of racing and practicing on property values and the statement that some neighbors could benefit if the properties became attractive for commercial uses. I can't put a dollar value reduction on my property but can only give you my perspective as an acreage owner. I live out here for one major reason, for the tranquility of the area. I am family oriented and we spend lots of time outside enjoying the nature and agricultural activities. I would never consider buying property by a race track. There are properties in this area that haven't sold since the rumor of the drag strip began. As for properties becoming attractive for commercial use this land is not zoned commercial and according to the comprehensive plan is supposed to be left in its present state. Please don't let these grandiose projections of economic development cloud your judgment. All one has to do is take a trip to Scribner and Greenwood race track to prove it's not true.

Now look at the growth of housing, stores, restaurants, auto malls, and retirement living. This is true economic development not hypothetical predictions. I have tried to be as factual as possible. 



Please vote **against** the Application for Special Use Permit 06051 submitted by Mr. Greg Sanford.

I am NOT opposed to drag racing for those who enjoy the sport. However, I have grave concerns about this proposed facility for the following reasons:

1) **resulting lower property values** - A young man from Lincoln stopped by our home recently. When he commented on the attractive area that we live in, I told him that a drag strip may be going in. His immediate, emphatic response was that he dreams of living outside Lincoln, but would never consider buying property for his family close to a raceway. Indeed, we would never have looked at our current home 5 years ago had we known a drag strip was coming. Such inappropriate zoning changes greatly hinder the confidence residents have in the county authorities responsible for the long term planning of our area.

2) **lack of integrity** - Rather than stating his intentions upfront, Mr. Sanford (via Mr. Hunzeker) tried to pull the wool over the eyes of nearby residents, the Planning Commission Members and the County Commissioners by addressing only the mining of soil at this site even though the final outcome was obvious to all. Please note these quotes taken from the NE Motorplex website promoting the drag strip:

"If they want to live in a country setting, there's plenty of it... head West."
-quoted from a post by "Bulldog" on the NE Motorplex web site dated September 15, 2006.

"When everyone here seems to wonder about how this thing can be put together to convince all the idiots in our city/county building , And the few clowns that live in the country. First lets give a big applause to Greg who has had the balls to even tackle such an agenda , that does not set well with some of our great citizens that live in there caves in the country."
-From "rmmpoar", dated September 21,2006

"We stopped racing at Scribner in 2000 so I have not been witness to the last few years of the track's operation but from the racers I have spoken to, all was not good. Car count was down considerably since its peak back around 1995. Common complaints from racers have been regarding management... if this track is going to be done to the highest level, maximum knowledge needs to be gained from their past experiences. I saw Scribner go from hundreds of cars on a weekend to dozens."
- From "drivestwin" dated September 29, 2006.

Such comments have alienated Mr. Sanford and his supporters from our community. Mr. Sanford did not establish a good working relationship with the nearby residents at the very start.

3) **admitted lack of accountability** by County officials regarding the soil mining sites - I am greatly concerned and am not confident that there would be any greater enforcement of regulations/restrictions placed upon the drag racing facility! Is there adequate law and emergency medical personnel to monitor both the racing facility and the needs of the current residents?

Determine in your own mind whether you believe that Mr. Sanford (and his racing friends) have the respect and the betterment of our community truly in mind!

4) *weekly disruption of our chosen lifestyle* by increased traffic, noise, litter/ waste, infringement on local water supply, more alcohol related disturbances, wildlife disturbance, etc. each weekend from March through November. We, as residents, do not want the load of monitoring his activities dealing with a less than upfront businessman!!

5) *children being educated in state-exempt private schools* would be subjected to the above distractions, issues of safety for those learning to drive, etc. Parents who are choosing to educate their children privately are no less committed to a quality education for their children than those in a public school setting. Would you approve a drag strip within 5 miles of a public school??

Mr. Sanford needs to look for a more conducive area for his racing facility. One that isn't in the middle of acreages and farms - homes to so many! Economic development can come about in a more positive way that benefits the whole community rather than a select few.



I oppose the granting of a special permit to Mr. Greg Sanford or GS Motorplex.

This proposed drag strip **does not fit the comprehensive plan** in several respects. The development is a commercial venture separated from the city by 5 miles. It is too far from city services. A commercial venture can not be sited on land zoned agricultural. A portion of land is prime Ag land. The preservation of prime Ag land is a consideration for our county. It is a special permit and is strongly opposed by the neighborhood.

This proposed drag strip would and **has already negatively impacted the property values** of the area. Several homes for sale remain unsold until this matter is decided. Potential home buyers have stated that they would not purchase a home in the vicinity of a drag strip. Also, potential future developments for acreages will be stopped. This negative impact is over 200 million dollars when you add up the bare land -- even at 20 acres lowest density home fill in. The drag strip would not generate anywhere near this economic benefit for the county. Drag strip fans will be local, not national, as Sanford claims. Since local fans will not need a motel room, claims of additional economic gain to the county are not substantiated. Note: Mr. Sanford's decision to shut down his track in Scribner is evidence that even local interest is dying out.

The owner has shown poor to abhorrent management skills at his track in Scribner, Nebraska. Once he assumed ownership, things went downhill. With his track record being poor, let's not give him a chance to ruin an entire area's potential development. No amount of Mr. Sanford telling us about this 130 acre site vs. his 700 acre site in Scribner will convince anyone who has been to a viable drag strip that this site is far enough away from neighbors. The **noise**, even despite attempts at abatement, would exceed tolerable levels. **Lights, PA system, and vibration** would also harm the neighbors. Local people in this area of the county moved here to enjoy peaceful rural life, and to pursue agricultural interests. Now the interests of one newcomer and a few racers are being imposed on the rural landowners of Northern Lancaster County. If Mr. Sanford truly desires to develop a national venue track, he should look in another county. Our county is far too populated.

The track in Topeka, Kansas is located on a huge 750 acre site, in conjunction with a circle track. It was an old airbase. That is obviously not comparable to Mr. Sanford's much smaller agricultural property here. Claims of a national venue just are not credible.

Finally, **safety and rescue services** would be stretched by this operation. It is possible several racetracks -- Eagle and I-80 in Greenwood -- would hold events on the same nights. This is in addition to high school events, and normal traffic hazards of a 6 lane I-80 and 4 lane Hwy 77. When an elderly person in the northern end of the county has a need, will emergency services arrive soon enough? The response time would be greatly increased. The local area volunteer rescue squads would be overburdened. The safety of all county residents could be jeopardized.

In short this proposed development is the wrong thing in the wrong place, with the wrong operator. And three wrongs don't make a right. Please vote **NO** on the **Special Permit Number 06051**.

The cemetery which has been a part of the community since 1884 is strongly opposed to the development of a motor sports complex or drag strip.






I would not go so far as to say Greg Sanford has become the Kim jong-il of Lancaster County, but I think there are some similarities in the way the two conduct business.



I am a home and farmland owner within the 1 mile radius of the proposed dragstrip. I am also on the board of the Danish Cemetary which is located on the west side of the road of the site. I am opposed to the development of the facility.

My reasons and concerns are many for opposing this site. Noise, location near the cemetary, effect on property values, traffic, air and runoff pollution, and overall disruption of peaceful rural existance to list a few.

This area is zoned AG/AGR in the comprehensive plan not commercial. This area should stay rural.

I have a major concern with noise. The cemetary sits on a hill in line of site with all of Mr. Sanfords land. I have read some of his "fixes" for this problem. Low frequency sound and vibration from 1000-horsepower unmuffled engines as well as high frequency loud speaker systems are not going to be controled with the "smoke and mirrors" approach suggested. Also Decibel levels should not be equated with noise levels. A muffled car passing on the highway is not that disruptive of a sound, however, a revving high powered engine, squeeling tires, blaring public address systems are NOISE.

Subject: Motorsports facility at Highway 77 and Davey Road

I am a current resident of Lancaster County living 3 miles east of Highway 77 on Davey Road. I wish to voice my opposition to the proposed motor sports facility to be located between Branched Oak Road and Davey Road on Highway 77. People choose to reside in various locals based upon a multitude of factors. City dwellers choose an urban lifestyle based upon a variety of economic and services oriented reasons - rent may be cheaper, commuting distances shorter, retail shops, services and medical providers are close by, roads are cleared swiftly, entertainment venues are myriad and easily accessible, employment opportunities are increased, etc. Of course, along with the positive aspects there are always negative issues. Cities are noisy, polluted and crowded. Roads are congested. Cities may have higher taxes and certainly have higher crime rates. People choose to balance certain benefits with drawbacks.

I choose to live in a rural environment for the specific amenities that such an environment offers. I am willing to accept the drawbacks of that choice in order to obtain the lifestyle I prefer. I own animals and wish the freedom to have a horse or dog without smell, noise or other issue putting a neighbor's nose out of joint. I want to look at fields, trees and vistas and not a neighbor's garage door or living room window. I want to hear birds and coyotes and not the neighbor's, kids, stereo or arguments. I wish to avoid areas of high crime rates and traffic congestion. Along with that, I do not wish to deal with disruptive commercial enterprises in my neighborhood.

I live in the country to avoid noise, pollution and crowds. The number of people driving Davey Road is already unbelievable as is the amount of alcoholic beverage containers that weekly dot the roadway. The dust from cars and semis that already utilize the road is a regular problem. A commercial enterprise of this nature would only enhance this undesirable situation. Littering, drunk driving and traffic would all increase if a raceway facility is located in the area. Speeding and running of stop signs will become worse. I have to drive this road in order to go to work and to obtain the essentials of living. I do not wish to increase my chances of encountering a drunk driver nor will I appreciate the increased traffic noise and wind blown dust from the dirt roads. What police force will be assigned to monitor the local roadways on a regular basis to insure transportation safety and rules of the road compliance? Littering will increase and who will be responsible for its clean-up?

I am currently able to hear the train whistle from the Waverly crossing area which is approximately 5 or 6 miles away. The noise from racing engines only 3 miles away will be a constant irritation. Instead of a quiet turnoff with a single street lamp, the Davey Road and Highway 77 crossing will become busy and congested. The high power lights from a raceway will replace the tranquil night sky of stars and moon.

While cities have a large cadre of police officers to patrol the streets, rural areas have very limited police presence. People coming into rural areas are well aware of this fact. Although a strong police presence will not deter all crime, rural residents will lack the even this protection. Large groups of non-resident people will be drawn to the area and the possibilities of vandalism, theft and home break-ins will increase correspondingly. Trespassing on private lands will increase as people unfamiliar with and lacking respect for property owner's rights increase. Littering, gates left open, animals harassed and the inevitable drunkards and party goers peeing along the roadside will all occur. People will drink and drive in increasing numbers. Local residents wishing to bike ride, horseback ride or walk their dog along country roads will do so at increased risk from motor vehicle injury, assault and harassment. Children and pets will be at increased risk of injury and harm. Wildlife will suffer as habitat is destroyed and disruption occurs from increased noise and human activity. Increased traffic will result in increased incidence of wildlife road kill.

In return for increased noise, pollution, littering, traffic and potential crime, rural residents will receive

annoyance, increased insurance claims, lack of privacy, disruptions, (in short, most of the negative aspects of urban dwelling but without the benefits) and decreased property values. Will there be a corresponding decrease in taxes? From my point of view as a rural resident, all of the rural amenities that I cherish will be negatively impacted. And who will benefit? A single business enterprise and its constituency, most of whom do not live in the impacted area and therefore will not need to tolerate all of the negative impacts that will arise. This single enterprise will benefit financially on locals' misery and loss. Its constituency will receive the pleasures of its sport without any of the devastating drawbacks.

It is apparently becoming a common practice for governing bodies in the political arena to readily mollify businesses to the detriment of impacted local residents when those impacted are low in numbers. Rural areas become prime targets, not because of judicial attention to fairness and equity, but because numbers and money talk. If the proposed facility is approved, what do those granting this approval propose to do to alleviate the negative impacts? How do you intend to provide services to offset potential problems including increased crime, traffic, and road maintenance needs? How do you intend to handle nuisance law complaints? How are liability issues to be addressed? Do you intend to decrease taxes as property values will be negatively impacted? How do the planning commission and board of commissioners plan to address and offset the numerous negative impacts for those residing in this area? In my opinion, nothing can compensate me for the losses I will incur if this plan goes forward. Rural residents will suffer so that someone else may reap a financial benefit.






