History

In June 1989, over 80,000 people gathered at Antelope Park to view the traveling Vietnam Memorial Wall. The area where the "Wall" was located, originally a ball field, became a sacred area for many people and was never the same.

A citizens advisory committee was appointed by Mayor Bill Harris in 1991 to provide guidance regarding development and management of Lincoln's Veterans Memorial Garden.

Lincoln's Little Sister of Lady Liberty

Lincoln Boy Scouts donated Lincoln's Little Sister of Liberty in 1951. It is one of about 200 replicas of the Statue of Liberty that were donated to communities in 39 states to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America. The statue was originally dedicate at the corner of 27th and A streets. After two moves, it now stands in the Veterans Memorial Garden.

Events are held in the Veterans Memorial Garden each year recognizing Memorial Day, Patriots' Day, Veterans Day and Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day. On these, and other holidays, all 46 flags are flying in commemoration.

An annual dedication of newly placed Bricks of Honor is held on the second Saturday in June.

BRICKS OF HONOR
