- Covid Numbers are continuing to drop. There are still vaccination clinics for all doses at the Health Dept, physicians, and pharmacies.
- The City & County has new a new Human Resources Director, Barb Mcintyre.
- New staff members in the Mayor's office are T.J. McDowell and Amanda Barker.
- The City and Lancaster County released the Welcoming and Belonging Strategic Plan focused on welcoming immigrants and refugees. Find it on the City's website under One Lincoln.
- LES is starting an integrated resource planning process to forecast future power needs. Summer public meetings will be held and hope you will participate.

Let's Talk Trees – See attached PowerPoint presentation. The 150<sup>th</sup> Arbor Day is this year.

- Street Tree Voucher Program available for planting new street trees. \$250 is redeemable at local nurseries. Sidewalk space must be at least 6 feet wide, but a waiver can be received if the sidewalk space is too narrow. Contact forestry@lincoln.ne.gov
- Adopt an Ash Program allows residents to treat ash street trees. The injection method is completed by a licensed arborist and requires treatment every 2 to 3 years. A map is on the City's website showing all ash street trees & which are treated & not treated.
- New contractual street tree planting efforts in low- and moderate-income areas to replace ash street trees This program focus is on central city neighborhoods with an emphasis on replacing ash street trees. The new Community Forestry Planner, Mike Fallon, will be contacting

- neighborhoods about street tree planting projects and looking for volunteer assistance with watering young trees. Reach Mike at mfallon@lincoln.ne.gov.
- Work with neighborhood associations on free tree distribution yard trees to be planted on private property. Trees will come from Great Plains Nursery, are 4-6 feet tall and in 3-gallon containers. Neighborhood volunteers will be needed to help to distribute trees. Several varieties will be available.
- At Risk Private Tree Removal and Replacement Grant Program for low- and moderate-income property owners grants to remove dead & dying trees on private property. New replacement trees will also be provided. Contact Loren Roberts with the City's Urban Development Department at <a href="mailto:lroberts@lincoln.ne.gov">lroberts@lincoln.ne.gov</a>. Funds come from a grant that needs to be used within 3 years.

#### Questions

- What chemical is being used to treat trees?
- Concerned about trees that have had the centers cut out because power lines run through them. Trees are no longer allowed to be replanted under power lines. Instead, staff are working with residents to plant in yards.
- Are streets that have no sidewalks but have trees in the public right-of-way eligible for tree replacement? Yes.
