Members of the LGBTQ+ and allies from all over Nebraska gathered Saturday at the Capitol to celebrate Pride month with Lincoln's second-ever Pride parade.

The parade, organized by Star City Pride, is a part of an annual two-day festival founded in 2008. The celebration stands as Nebraska's second-largest Pride festival.

Hundreds chanted "Our home,

here to stay!" as they walked around the Capitol handing out pride stickers and information on how to be an ally.

For several, this was their first Pride parade, and for others, this was just one of many events over many years fighting for the rights of the LGBTQ+ community. The parade comes just days after Lincoln City Council rescinded a fairness ordinance aimed at extending protections in city code 1 to include gender expression and V sexual orientation.



Council hears testimony on fairness ordinance

City code revisions have been brought back after 10 years

Supporters and opponents turned out in nearly equal measure to the Lincoln City Council's meeting Monday to testify on an issue that sat dormant for 10 years: revising municipal code to expand protection against discrimination to include sexual orientation and gender identity.

Proponents said revising the ordinance was important he cause it was the right thin do, because it would align (code with federal law and th it would boost the economy ar help the city grow by attractin and retaining young people.

"I'm like most people with friends and families in this group that will be affected by these revisions," Susan Soriente said. "I believe justice matters. T want all propine living of visioning re-

and their rights are protected. This revision is a step in the right direction."

Opponents said civil rights laws already provide protections, that the Bible defines sex as male and female, that the revisions would allow "unfettered access" to bathrooms and locker rooms, endangering women and children, and that the question should be decided by voters - as it should have been a decade ago.

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Fired-up Biden signs abortion access order

WASHINGTON – President Joe Biden on Friday condemned the "extreme" Supreme Court majority that ended a constitutional right to abortion and delivered an impassioned plea for Americans upset by the decision to "vote, vote, vote vote" in November.

Under rising pressure from fellow Democrats to be more forceful in response to the ruling, he signed an executive order to try to protect access to the procedure.

The actions Biden outlined are intended to head off some potential penalties that women seeking abortion may face, but his order cannot restore access to abortion in the more than a dozen states

where strict limits or total bans have gone into effect. About a dozen more states are set to impose additional restrictions.

Biden acknowledged the limitations facing his office, saying it would require an act of Congress to restore nationwide access to the way it was before the June 24 decision.

"The fastest way to restore Roe is to pass a national law," Biden said: "The challenge is go out and vote. For God's sake, there is an election in November!"


Biden's action formalized instructions to the Departments of Justice and Health and Human Services to push back on efforts to limit the ability of women to access federally approved

JACKSON, Ky. Trapped homeowners swam to safety and others were rescued by boat as record flash flooding killed at least 16 people in Kéntucky and swamped Appalachian entire towns, prompting a frenzied search for survivors Friday through some of the poorest communities in America.

Authorities warned the death toll would likely grow sharply as search efforts continued. The rain let up early Friday morning, but some waterways were not expected to crest until Saturday and more storms were forecast to roll through the region early next week.

Hot, dry year drops level in Columbus area

COLUMBUS - Before Lake McConaughy was constructed in the 1930s, the Platte River across Nebraska would dry up most years, according to Lyndon Vogt, general manager of the Central Platte Natural Resources District.

"Most people don't realize prior to McConaughy it went dry every year because of the snow melt in May, with this year coming in at

Colorado. Once the snow melt went off, it went dry," Vogt said.

With the advent of Lake McConaughy and Kingsley Dam, water was able to be backed up and allocated for future use, including for irrigation and other purposes. But because of recent very low

rainfall in areas of the state, the Platte River has gone dry in the Columbus area.

According to the National Weather Service office in Omaha, the Columbus area usually sees an average of 4.57 inches of rainfall in

2.64. For June, the average was 4.69, and this year totaled just 1.52. July, too, looks like it will come in below the average of 2.94 inches of rain.

"We're substantially below our average rainfall, it's very hot and very dry this year for this district," Vogt said.

House approves bill to help West fight wildfires, drought

WASHINGTON (AP) -The House on Friday approved wide-ranging legislation aimed at helping communities in the West cope with increasingly severe wildfires and drought - fueled by climate change -- that have caused billions of dollars of damage to homes and businesses in recent years.

The measure combines 49 separate bills and would increase firefighter pay and

benefits; boost resiliency and mitigation projects for communities affected by climate change; protect watersheds; and make it easier for wildfire victims to get federal assis tance

The bill was approved. 218-199, as firefighters in California battled a blaze that forced evacuation o thousands of people nea Yosemite National Park and crews in North Texas sough to contain another fire.
