We view the proposed regulations (dated July 8, 2015) from Lincoln/Lancaster County Health Department and Planning to be excessive, going beyond a zone of reasonableness. They single out wind energy for standards other commercial operations are not held to; and potentially prohibit landowners' productive use of their property.

The alternative regulations proposed by Volkswind have few differences (in respect of reasonable noise and setback limits) from those proposed by Lincoln / Lancaster County Health Department. Volkswind's alternative provides for a strict Board-administered penalty if complaints are proven valid. We urge you to adopt a reasonable set of rules to allow for future potential wind projects in the agricultural zones of Lancaster County.
