I would like to see wind farms developed safely and responsibly in my community. To assure that the Hallam Wind Project and future potential projects in rural parts of Lancaster County are not prohibited, I ask that you pass reasonable regulations.

I strongly encourage the adoption of reasonable wind farm regulations for the agricultural zone of Lancaster County. The current setback and sound limits are overly restrictive, are unnecessary in terms of health, safety and welfare of the public and county residents.

Wind power is a reliable, clean, renewable resource that will contribute to healthy communities in Lancaster County in many ways including:

- -- Substantial contribution to Lancaster County's tax base;
- -- County road maintenance and improvements;
- -- Landowner income and multiplier effects of additional income in local community;
- -- Contracting for goods and services associated with construction of a \$100m+ project;
- -- Producing power with no fuel, no water use, and no emissions; and
- -- Compatibility with current agricultural use land (crops, grazing, recreation, etc.)
