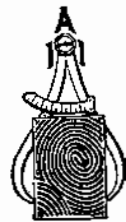

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P O L I C E P E N S I O N

The first Lincoln Police Department pension plan became effective on Sept. 7, 1947 under provisions of the State law passed by the Nebraska State Legislature in session at that time. This department has had 4 men on retirement under this plan at \$70.00 a month. Retired Officer John Jones died in 1952, and Retired Officer Ruby L. Nichols died in 1954, leaving 2 men and 1 widow currently on the retirement list under this pension law.

5 men are on the pension roll of the new pension law passed by the State Legislature in 1955, which provides that the officer may retire at the age of 55 after serving 25 years or, if working on the department at the time the law went into effect, he may retire at 55 after 21 years of service. Under this new law, he may retire on a pension of \$135.00 a month, with \$1.50 a month increase for each additional year of service after he becomes eligible to retire, but not to exceed a total increase of \$7.50. The retiring officer has the option of electing to receive the actuarial equivalent of his straight life pension on a reduced pension payable throughout his life and nominate a survivor beneficiary. Employees at present pay 4% of their salary up to \$3600.00 annual wages.

ANALYSIS
OF
MAN-POWER STRENGTH

On the following page is a chart illustrating the personnel on duty throughout a 24-hour day if all personnel were on duty. This distribution chart indicates the maximum man-hour strength, and does not allow for the one regular day off each week, the annual two-week vacation or annual two-week sick leave allowed to each member of the department. During 1955, there were 365 days; therefore, with a total of 117 employees, there was a possible maximum of 42,705 man-days of work. The regular days off total 6,084 man-days, and vacation time for the entire personnel totaled 1,338 days for the year of 1955; days off sick total 1,002, with 710 days off by permit, and 192 days off because of injuries sustained while on duty, making a total of 9,326 man-days off duty during the year of 1955. 939 days of overtime were worked, leaving a balance of 8,387 man-days off duty during the year. As a result, an average of 20% of the total personnel was off duty for one of the reasons listed above during each day of the year. To get an accurate analysis of the chart on the following page, it is necessary to take into consideration the fact that, during each hour of the day, approximately one-fifth of the personnel listed was off-duty. So, for all practical purposes, the actual true strength of our personnel is four-fifths of the numbers indicated on the chart.

During a 24-hour day, there are three principal shifts which report to headquarters for duty -- at 7:30 a.m., 3:30 p.m., and 11:30 p.m.; in addition, there is a supplemental shift of suburban cruiser officers which reports for duty at 7:30 p.m., and a shift of additional traffic personnel which reports for duty at 9:30 a.m. The officers report to headquarters for instruction and inspection one-half hour before the time they report for duty at their assigned beat or district. For example, the 7:30 a.m. shift officers are not actually at work on the streets until approximately 8:00 a.m. and, therefore, oncoming shifts are at their respective posts before off-going shifts report off duty, thus providing adequate time for the exchange of assignments without leaving streets unpatrolled.

Prior to 1946, the records do not indicate the break-down in all types of arrests such as warrants served and, prior to 1944, a breakdown was not made of parking tickets to indicate whether they were issued to local or foreign license plates.

During the year of 1941, the total number of traffic violations is exceptionally high for the reason that, during that year, a total of 1,224 violators were booked for brake and light inspection violations.

In the forepart of 1955, a new policy was established with reference to the serving of warrants, and all individuals who were served with a warrant were lodged in jail. On delinquent parking and moving violation tickets, a complaint is now filed in court and the violator notified to appear in court on a designated date, and the warrant not served as in the past. However, if the violator fails to appear in court as instructed, the warrant is then served and the violator lodged in jail.

A more complete analysis of each type of arrest for the year of 1955 will be found elsewhere in this report.

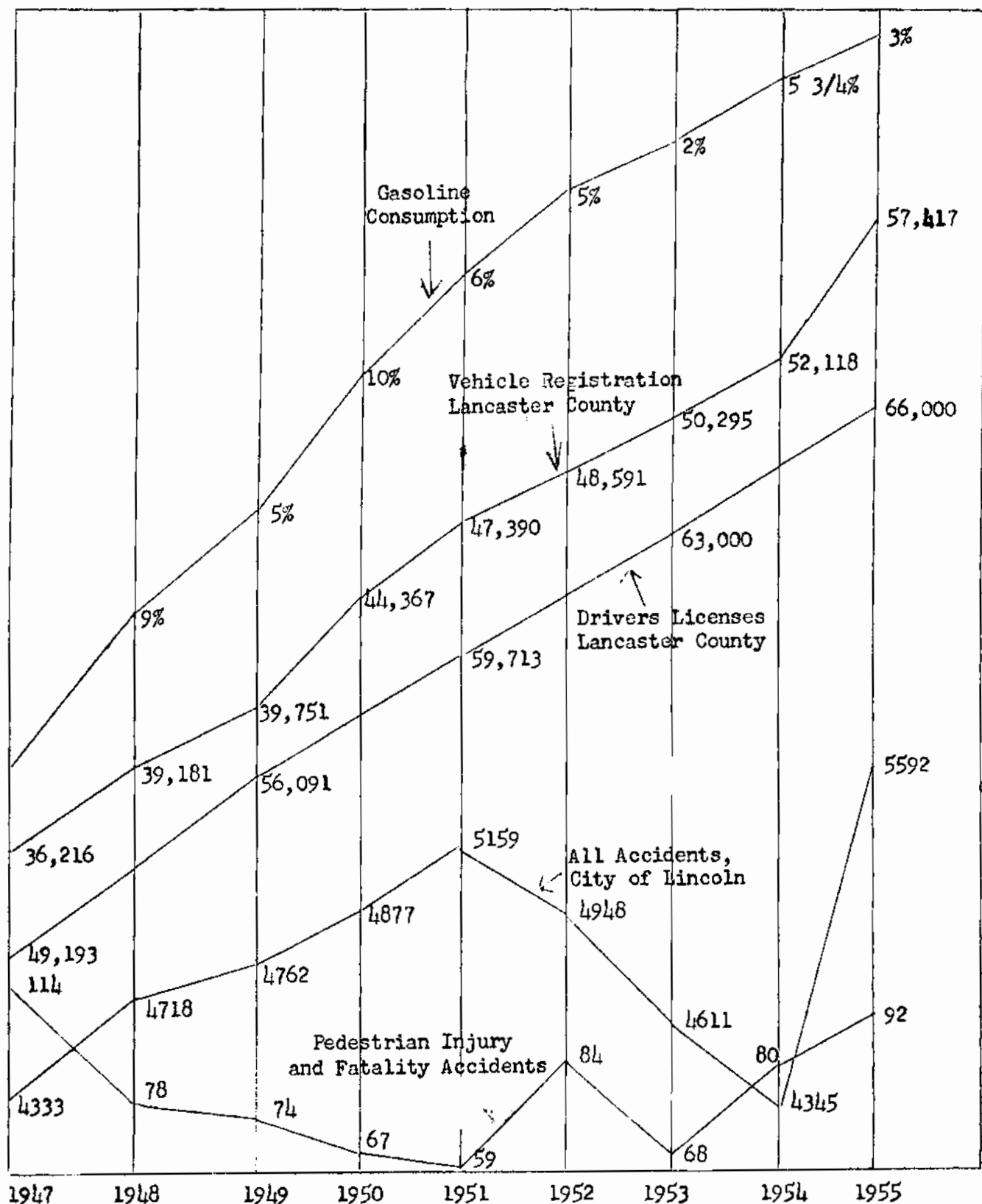

REVIEW OF 1955 TRAFFIC FATALITIES

No. 1

Monday, August 22, 1955, at 1:46 P.M.

Location: 56th Street between Benton and Colfax.

Killed: CAREN RANEY, age 3, 5503 Benton Street.

Little Caren Raney was a block and a half from home; she had crossed the street in the middle of the block to watch some older girls playing with their dolls in a tree house. Two girls up in the tree saw her start to run back across the street, only to be hit by a speeding car; the speed of the car was estimated to be over 35 miles per hour in a 25-mile zone. The force of the impact hurled the little girl's body against a parked car and then bounced her head on the cement curb. The driver of the car was Lowell K. Johnson, age 43, of 6701 Adams Street. Caren was taken to the hospital where she passed away two days later on August 24, 1955 at 11:55 a.m.

This fatality brought to an end 244 days without a traffic fatality in Lincoln.

No. 2

MOTOR VEHICLE - PEDESTRIAN

Sunday, December 25, 1955, at 6:00 P.M.

Location: Between 23rd and 24th on R Street.

Killed: JAMES ESTES, age 53, 1985 S Street.

This accident occurred on Christmas Day. James Estes was walking diagonally across the street in the middle of the block from the north to the south. It was after dark and the driver of the car, Father George J. Schuster, age 44, of 1602 Que Street, stated he did not see the pedestrian until just before the impact. Officers measured 94 feet of skid marks, which indicated the driver was speeding; he was booked for court but the case was lost in court. The doctor examining the pedestrian reported he was intoxicated. The pedestrian was hospitalized and died on January 13, 1956, at 4:27 A.M. as a result of injuries received in this accident.

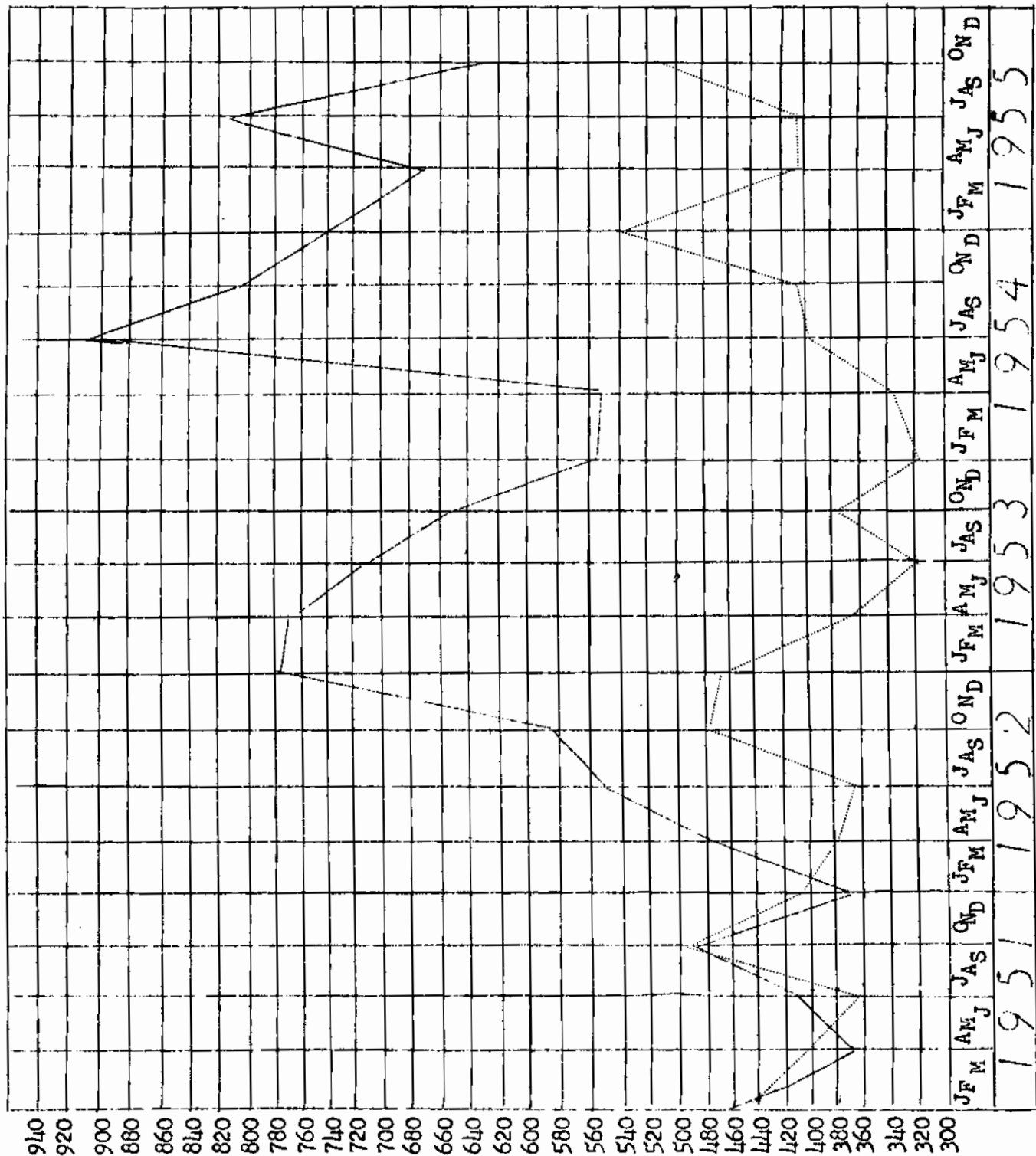
This traffic death prevented the City of Lincoln from establishing an all-time record of only one motor vehicle traffic death during the period of a year, which had been announced at the end of the year of 1955.

There were 42,410 tickets issued to violators with out-of-town license plates during 1955, compared to 44,450 in 1954, a decrease of 4%. Of the total in 1955, 17,218 or 41% did not appear as compared to 47% in 1954; 9,751 or 23% paid penalties as compared to 15% in 1954; 4,732 or 11% were dismissed as courtesy notices at headquarters as compared to 10% in 1954; and 10,709 or 25% were mailed to headquarters as provided by our courtesy dismissal policy as compared to 28% in 1954.

To discourage those violators who fail to make disposition of their parking violation tickets until after they have received letters of reminder from this department, a policy was inaugurated in 1950 which provides that a parking violator shall pay a one-dollar penalty at the Violations Bureau if disposition is made within five days after issuance date of the ticket. After five days have elapsed, a two-dollar penalty is assessed for parking tickets. Seven days after issuance date, if there is no disposition made of the ticket, a letter is sent to the owner of the car as a reminder of the unpaid ticket. If no response is made to this warning, a warrant for court appearance is automatically issued eighteen days after date of the ticket.

Licensing of bicycles in 1955 was begun in March with a schedule of the schools. Plates were issued in 1955 at 38 schools in the City of Lincoln at the start of the bicycle licensing year; 5,254 plates were placed on bikes at public grade schools, 225 at the high schools, and 695 at parochial schools. Also, arrangements were made to provide for licensing of bicycles at Huskerville, where 48 bicycles were licensed.

Beginning with the year of 1956, the City officials authorized the 1955 bicycle license plates as permanent plates, and bicycles will no longer need to be relicensed annually. The personnel at the Fire Stations located throughout the city will in the future do all licensing of bicycles; in this way, bicycle owners in any part of the city may take their bicycle to the most conveniently-located fire station for licensing.
