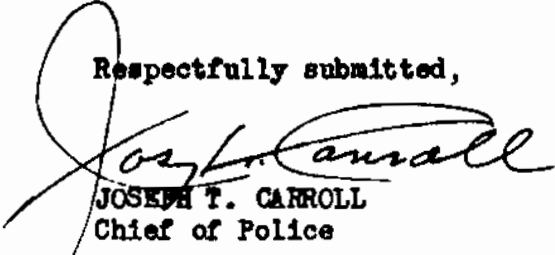
It is with pleasure that I submit to you the annual report of the activities of the Lincoln Police Department for the calendar year of 1957.

During a 24-hour day, there are three principal shifts which report to headquarters for duty - at 7:30 a.m., 3:30 p.m., and 11:30 p.m. In addition, there is a supplemental shift of suburban cruiser officers which reports for duty at 7:30 p.m., and a shift of additional traffic personnel which reports for duty at 9:30 a.m. These officers report to headquarters for instructions and inspection one-half hour before the time they report for duty in their assigned beat or district. For example, the 7:30 a.m. shift officers are not actually at work on the streets until approximately 8:00 a.m. and, therefore, oncoming shifts are at their respective posts before off-going shifts report off duty, thus providing adequate time for the exchange of assignments without leaving the streets unpatrolled.

The above chart illustrates the personnel on duty throughout a 24-hour day if all personnel were on duty. This distribution chart indicates the maximum man-hour strength, and does not allow for the one regular day off each week, the annual two-week vacation or two-week sick leave allowed to each member of the department. There is an approximate average of 20% of the total personnel off duty for one of these reasons during each day of the year. To get an accurate analysis of this chart, it is necessary to take into consideration the fact that, during each hour of the day, approximately one-fifth of the personnel listed was off duty. So for all practical purposes, the actual true strength of our personnel is four-fifths of the numbers indicated on this chart.

IACP POLICE TRAINING PROGRAM

AFGHANISTAN

In collaboration with
THE INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION ADMINISTRATION
(U. S. Government)

The Lincoln Police Department was one of several law enforcement agencies which cooperated in this project of the Training Division of the International Association of Chiefs of Police in collaboration with the International Cooperation Administration, State Department of the U. S. Government, for the promoting of the exchange of police information and providing technical assistance to visiting police officials.

Under this plan, Mr. ABDUL GHAFOR RAOFI of Afghanistan, Chief Clerk of the Personnel Section, Ministry of Interior, Royal Afghan Government, was one of a group of fifteen Afghan officers selected from the Department of Interior of the Royal Government of Afghanistan to be assigned to positions in the Afghanistan Police Department after the completion of their training in the United States.

Mr. Raofi underwent three months of practical on-the-job training with this department, from June 17th through September 20th, 1957, studying all phases of criminal investigation, with particular emphasis on the following:

1. Basic criminal investigation.
2. Securing and preservation of evidence.
3. Report writing.
4. Case preparation for court.
5. Modus Operandi files.
6. Final reports.

In addition, he worked on the various shifts and with each of the various details, to give him first-hand working knowledge of the various functions and over-all operation of the department.

Prior to his on-the-job training here, Mr. Raofi had basic training of nine weeks at the Cincinnati, Ohio, Police Training Academy and four weeks of basic training at the Texas A & M College. The practical experience which he received in his on-the-job training here aided in his preparation for his police administration position upon his return to his country. In Afghanistan, he had attended Ghazi College for twelve years, and had served on the Law Faculty of Kabul University for three years.

This department considers our participation in this program very valuable to both the trainee and to this department, for it afforded an excellent opportunity for exchanging professional information through this direct contact with a police department in operation. We sincerely believe this particular project of the IACP Training Division will contribute much to the promotion of cooperation and understanding on an international basis.

This figure does include persons booked at headquarters and released without being lodged in jail.

Prior to 1946, the records do not indicate the break-down in all types of arrests such as warrants served and, prior to 1944, a break-down was not made of parking tickets to indicate whether issued to local or foreign violators.

During the year of 1941, the total number of traffic violations is exceptionally high for the reason that, during that year, a total of 1,224 violators were booked for brake and light inspection violations.

In the forepart of 1955, a new policy was established with reference to the serving of warrants, and all individuals who were served with a warrant were lodged in jail. On delinquent parking and moving violation tickets, a complaint is now filed in court and the violator notified to appear in court on a designated date, and the warrant not served as in the years prior to 1955. However, if the violator fails to appear in court as instructed, the warrant is then served and the violator lodged in jail.

A more complete analysis of each type of arrest for the year of 1957 will be found elsewhere in this report.

REVIEW OF 1957 MOTOR VEHICLE TRAFFIC FATALITIES

No. 1

MOTOR VEHICLE - FIXED OBJECT

Sunday, February 17, 1957, at 3:08 A.M.

Location: Cotner Blvd. between Starr and Holdrege.

Killed: CECIL V. DRAKE, age 34, 4936 Benton, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Captain Cecil Drake of the Lincoln Air Force Base was traveling northeast on Cotner at a high rate of speed. He was unable to make the turn due to excess speed, running off the street and crashing into a tree just north of Starr Street on the east side of the street. He was killed instantly as the top of his head was severed completely from his body. A laboratory examination of a blood specimen showed a high alcoholic content. The 1955 Buick Century automobile he was driving was a total wreck.

No. 2

MOTOR VEHICLE - MOTOR VEHICLE

Friday, March 1, 1957, at 7:38 A.M.

Location: 6th and D.

Killed: ADAM HUBER, age 68, 901 A Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Mr. Huber, retired, received serious injuries in a right-angle collision between his northbound vehicle and a car driven by Joseph O'Hara, who was driving west on D Street. Mr. Huber failed to yield the right-of-way to the vehicle on his right. O'Hara's car collided with the right side of the Huber car toward the front, causing it to go up over the curb and onto the lawn on the northwest corner. Mr. Huber was taken to the hospital in an unconscious condition and passed away at 8:00 A.M. April 2nd, 1957, as a result of the injuries sustained in this accident.

No. 3

Tuesday, July 2, 1957, at 7:45 A.M.

Location: 11th and Que.

Killed: MILLINGTON B. PACKARD, age 78, 4228 Garland, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Mr. Millington Packard, retired, was seriously injured as a driver in a 3-car collision. He had stopped for the stop sign and drove south into the intersection without seeing a westbound car driven by Robert L. Harder, age 21, of 1334 Washington. The impact caused Mr. Packard's 53 Plymouth car to turn a quarter of the way around and collide with a third vehicle headed east but stopped, driven by Charles H. Hinds, age 54, of 1904 Harwood. A passenger with Mr. Packard, Merle L. Huff, age 52, 4822 Garland, was also internally injured. Mr. Huff recovered but Mr. Packard died July 24th at 10:45 A.M. as a result of injuries received in this accident.

No. 4

MOTOR VEHICLE - PEDESTRIAN

Friday, December 27, 1957, at 3:59 P.M.

Location: Cornhusker Highway between 11th and 12th.

Killed: LINDA K. DUNLAP, age 10, 1441 So. 14th, Omaha, Nebraska.

Linda Dunlap was visiting relatives at 1161 Saunders Street, and was returning with three of her cousins from the Breslow Grocery Store at 1144 Cornhusker Highway. Traffic along the highway was heavy and her older cousin, a girl of 13, had dashed across the highway and was walking toward home when Linda Dunlap stepped into the path of a southwest-bound car driven by Frank O. Paswaters, age 77, of Raymond, Nebraska, who was driving about 20 or 25 miles an hour. He had observed three children waiting beside the highway and didn't see the girl suddenly step in front of his car. She was bleeding from the nose and mouth and was pronounced dead upon arrival at the hospital.

BICYCLE - TRAIN

Saturday, August 3, 1957, at 6:45 P.M.

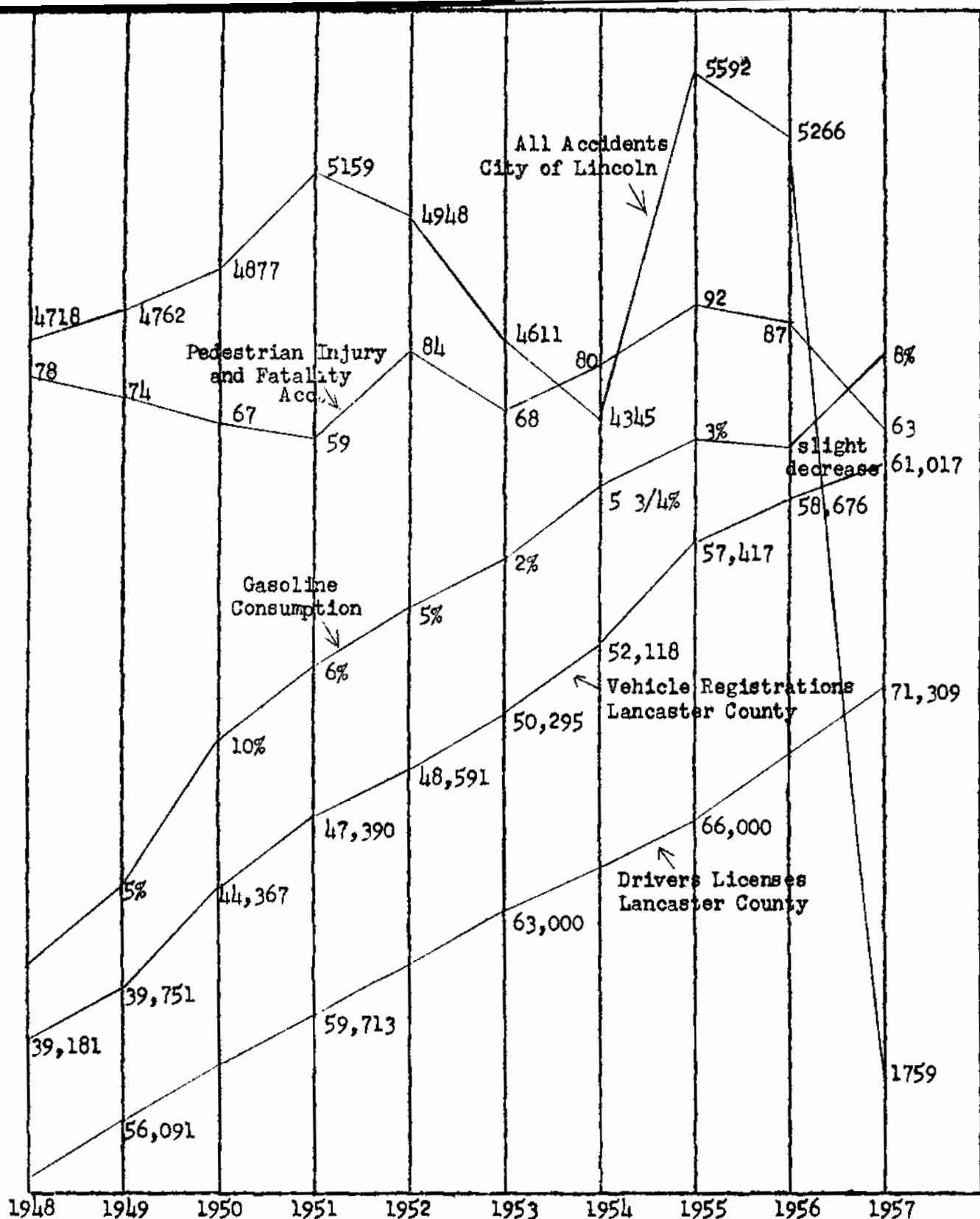
Location: 17th Street between Holdrege and Court.

Killed: James Yost, age 15, 1318 Claremont.

James Yost was killed instantly after he had disregarded the automobile railroad signal arms. He rode his bicycle around the gate on the south side of the tracks and stopped in the middle of the first pair of tracks and stood astraddle of his bicycle. There were three pairs of railroad tracks. He did pay any attention to the whistle signal of the train and made no attempt to get out of the way of the oncoming westbound train. He apparently thought the train was on one of the other two pairs of railroad tracks. There were several witnesses to this tragedy. The engineer was Earl Closson of 4300 J Street. James' body was hurled a distance of 178 feet from the point of impact.

The past ten years are included on this graph to show the percentage rise in the consumption of gasoline, increase in the automobile registrations and drivers licenses issued, to compare with the increase and decrease of all accidents and pedestrian injury and fatality accidents experienced. In noting the sharp decrease in accidents in the year of 1957, it must be remembered that a change in the city ordinance now requires the reporting of only those accidents involving an injury or fatality or property damage in excess of one hundred dollars; this compares with the ordinance formerly in effect which required the reporting of all accidents.

Gasoline percentage is figured on the State of Nebraska consumption. Automobile registrations and drivers licenses were those issued in Lancaster County.

To discourage those violators who fail to make disposition of their parking violation tickets until after they have received letters of reminder from this department, a policy was inaugurated in 1950 which provides that a parking violator shall pay a one-dollar penalty at the Violations Bureau if disposition is made within five days after issuance date of the ticket. After five days have elapsed, a two-dollar penalty is assessed for parking tickets. Seven days after the issuance date, if there is no disposition made of the ticket, a letter is sent to the owner of the car as a reminder of the unpaid ticket. If no response is made to this warning, a warrant for court appearance is automatically issued 18 days after date of the ticket. Provisions were made in 1957 for the Violations Bureau to handle the disposition of tickets for "Interfering with the use of the street", with a five-dollar penalty assessed within the five-day period, and a seven-dollar penalty after the five days have elapsed.

The above tickets for license plate and light violations do not include those violations which were booked for appearance in Municipal Court. The expiration

date for renewal of automobile license plates is March 1st; official tickets are issued to all vehicles in operation with delinquent license plates after that date. If the operator or owner of the vehicle reports to headquarters with proper license plates affixed to his vehicle, he is not booked for court, provided that his new registration certificate is dated prior to March 1st.
