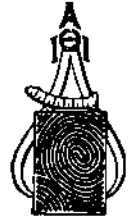

Dear Sir:

I am pleased to submit to you the annual report of the activities of the Lincoln Police Department for the year of 1959. We are sure that you will find much interesting and informative data in the statistical reports contained herein.

It is with pride that we report that this department continues to maintain its high standing among police departments over the nation, and we feel that the members of the department should be commended for conducting themselves in a manner reflecting credit to the department and the community.

In contrast with the rising crime trend over the country, we are pleased to report that Lincoln experienced a 2% decrease in total offenses reported under the Uniform Crime Classification. 26% of these offenses were cleared by arrest, which is an increase of 2% over the year of 1958. Of the more serious crimes, which excludes petit thefts under \$50, 28% of the cases were cleared.

For exceptional performance in Traffic Supervision, this department for the fourth consecutive year received an award from the National Safety Council and the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and for the second consecutive year an award for Maintenance of Traffic Accident Records, as well as special recognition for exceptional death record and progressive accident prevention program activities.

These achievements were possible even though we experienced a 20% turnover in personnel during the year, and our total authorized strength fell far short of the recommended minimum.

We would like to acknowledge our appreciation to the citizens of Lincoln for their fine cooperation, without which we would be severely handicapped in our efforts to make Lincoln a safe and desirable city in which to live.

We especially want to express our sincere appreciation to you and your office, other city officials, the Federal Bureau of Investigation and other law enforcement agencies, the Lincoln Traffic Commission, the news media, the business firms and civic groups of our city. With this continued cooperation and support, this department will continue to make further advancements in the field of law enforcement.

During a 24-hour day, there are three principal shifts which report to headquarters for duty - at 6:30 a.m., 2:30 p.m., and 10:00 p.m. In addition, there is a supplemental shift of suburban cruiser officers which reports for duty at 7:30 p.m., and a shift of additional traffic personnel which reports for duty at 9:30 a.m. These officers report to headquarters for instructions and inspection one-half hour before the time they report for duty in their assigned beat or district. For example, the 6:30 a.m. shift officers are not actually at work on the streets until approximately 8:00 a.m. and, therefore, oncoming shifts are at their respective posts before off-going shifts report off duty, thus providing adequate time for the exchange of assignments without leaving the streets unpatrolled.

The above chart illustrates the personnel on duty throughout a 24-hour day if all personnel were on duty. This distribution chart indicates the maximum man-hour strength, and does not allow for the one regular day off each week, the annual two-week vacation or two-weeks sick leave allowed to each member of the department. There is an approximate average of 20% of the total personnel off duty for one of these reasons during each day of the year. To get an accurate analysis of this chart, it is therefore necessary to take into consideration the fact that, during each hour of the day, approximately one-fifth of the personnel listed was off-duty. So, for all practical purposes, the actual true strength of our personnel is four-fifths of the numbers indicated on this chart.

This figure does include persons booked at headquarters and released without being lodged in jail.

Prior to 1946, the records do not indicate the breakdown in all types of arrests, such as warrants served and, prior to 1944, a breakdown was not made of parking tickets to indicate whether issued to local or foreign violators.

During the year of 1941, the total number of traffic violations is exceptionally high for the reason that, during that year, a total of 1,224 violators were booked for brake and light inspection violations.

In the forepart of 1955, a new policy was established in the serving of warrants, and all individuals who were served with a warrant were lodged in jail. On delinquent parking and moving violation tickets, a complaint is now filed in court and the violator notified to appear in court on a designated date, and the warrant not served as in the years prior to 1955. However, if the violator fails to appear in court as instructed, the warrant is then served and the violator is lodged in jail.

A more complete analysis of each type of arrest for the year of 1959 will be found elsewhere in this report.

REVIEW OF 1959 MOTOR VEHICLE TRAFFIC FATALITIES

No. 1

Tuesday, August 18, 1959, at 4:19 P.M.

Location: 68th and Fremont Streets.

Killed: DAVID LEE HAGAMAN, age 19, Waverly, Nebraska.

David was riding his 1957 Triumph motorcycle east on Fremont Street and the driver of a truck, Albert Kassik Sr., age 80, of Milligan, Nebraska, was traveling west on Fremont. Upon reaching the intersection of 68th and Fremont, Mr. Kassik proceeded to make a left turn to go south on 68th. Mr. Kassik stated that his windshield was a little dirty and dusty and that he did not see David until just before the impact. David Hagaman died instantly.

Mr. Kassik was given a citation for driving on the wrong side of the street.

No. 2

Saturday, September 5, 1959, at 1:04 P.M.

Location: 26th and O Streets.

Killed: ALVIN E. KLOEPPER, age 68, 126 No. 27th Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Mr. Kloepper was walking across O Street, south-bound, in the west crosswalk at 26th Street, when he was struck by a vehicle driven by Edvins Rankis, age 27, of 1901 No. 67th Street. The eastbound vehicle struck the pedestrian as he neared the south curb of O Street. The driver had just driven from the Hinky Dinky parking lot and had observed the pedestrian crossing the street but thought that the pedestrian would be out of the way when the car reached the crosswalk. The driver then looked into the rear-view mirror getting ready to change lanes of traffic and the next thing he knew the pedestrian had yelled and then was knocked down. Mr. Kloepper stated that he did not see the car before the impact.

The pedestrian did not want to go to the hospital but, upon the insistence of the investigating officer, proceeded to the hospital to be checked. He died at 3:15 P.M. the following day of internal injuries and broken pelvic bone.

Mr. Rankis was cited for failure to yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian.

No. 3

MOTOR VEHICLE - MOTOR VEHICLE

Monday, October 12, 1959, at 11:43 P.M.

Location: Oak Street between 7th and 9th.

Killed: JOHN W. COPPOCK, age 21, 1502 Garfield, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Mr. Coppock was driving his 1950 Buick automobile east on Oak Street and, as the vehicle edged over to the south side of the street, the right wheels appeared to drop off of the pavement into a rut. According to witnesses, Mr. Coppock jerked the steering wheel to get the car back onto the pavement, but pulled too hard and the car shot clear across the roadway into the path of a 1950 Ford truck driven by Perry L. Smith of Lexington, Nebraska.

Mr. Coppock died instantly of severe head injuries and no citation was issued. Damage to the Coppock car was extensive.

No. 4, 5, and 6

MOTOR VEHICLE - FIXED OBJECT

Monday, November 9, 1959, at 11:00 P.M.

Location: North Cotner between X and Y Streets.

Killed: FRED CHAFELLE, age 18, 4126 Greenwood, Lincoln, Nebraska.
JACK GIEBELHAUS, age 19, 4600 No. 70th Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.
DOUGLAS CROOK, age 17, 2904 No. 52nd Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

These three teen-agers were killed when the car in which they were riding crashed into a tree at a high rate of speed. The car was a 1956 Chevrolet driven by Fred Chapelle and owned by his parents. Ted Gekas, age 17, of 6310 Benton, a passenger riding in the left-rear seat of the vehicle, was the lone survivor. The car was completely demolished.

With the consent of the owners of the car and the assistance of Kaar's Service, this wrecked car was hauled around to all of the Senior High Schools in the city and was on display for at least one day, offering mute testimony as to what speed can do. Many sober faces were observed as the boys and girls inspected this car as it sat each day in front of their school buildings.

No. 7

MOTOR VEHICLE - PEDESTRIAN

Tuesday, December 22, 1959, at 5:18 P.M.

Location: 22nd and South Streets.

Killed: EFFIE POWELL, age 67, 2046 So. 24th Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Miss Powell was walking north across South Street at 22nd and was in the west crosswalk when she was struck by a 1951 Packard sedan driven by Mary M. Knapp,

age 43, of 1900 Euclid, which was west-bound on South Street. The pedestrian stated that at no time did she see the oncoming car, and the driver said that she did not see the pedestrian until she was in front of the vehicle. The brakes on the car had to be pumped before they would take hold; the right front wheel brake was the only brake working.

Miss Powell passed away on December 29, 1959 at 6:57 p.m. The driver of the car was cited for Failure to Yield the Right-of-way to a Pedestrian and Defective Brakes.

In summing up the five accidents which took seven lives on the streets of Lincoln, Nebraska during the calendar year of 1959, we must conclude that a definite responsibility lies on the shoulders of our pedestrians to look carefully for all moving vehicles on the street when crossing. Also, an even greater responsibility lies with our drivers to watch for pedestrians and to see that his vehicle is in safe driving condition at all times. We must all realize that our laws have been enacted to protect us from involvement in accidents. If the toll of accidents is to be halted, it can only be with the aid of all drivers and pedestrians in obeying these laws. Each of us must accept our personal responsibility for the solution to traffic safety problems.

To discourage those violators who fail to make disposition of their parking violation tickets until after they have received letters of reminder from this department, a policy was inaugurated in 1950 which provides that a parking violator shall pay a one-dollar penalty at the Violations Bureau if disposition is made within five days after issuance date of the ticket. After five days have elapsed, a two-dollar penalty is assessed for parking tickets. Seven days after date of issuance, if there is no disposition made of the ticket, a letter is sent to the owner of the vehicle as a reminder of the unpaid ticket. If no response is made to this warning, a warrant for court appearance is automatically issued 18 days after date of the ticket. Provisions were made in 1957 for the Violations Bureau to handle the disposition of tickets for "Interfering with the use of the street", with a five-dollar penalty assessed within the five-day period and a seven-dollar penalty after the five days have elapsed.
