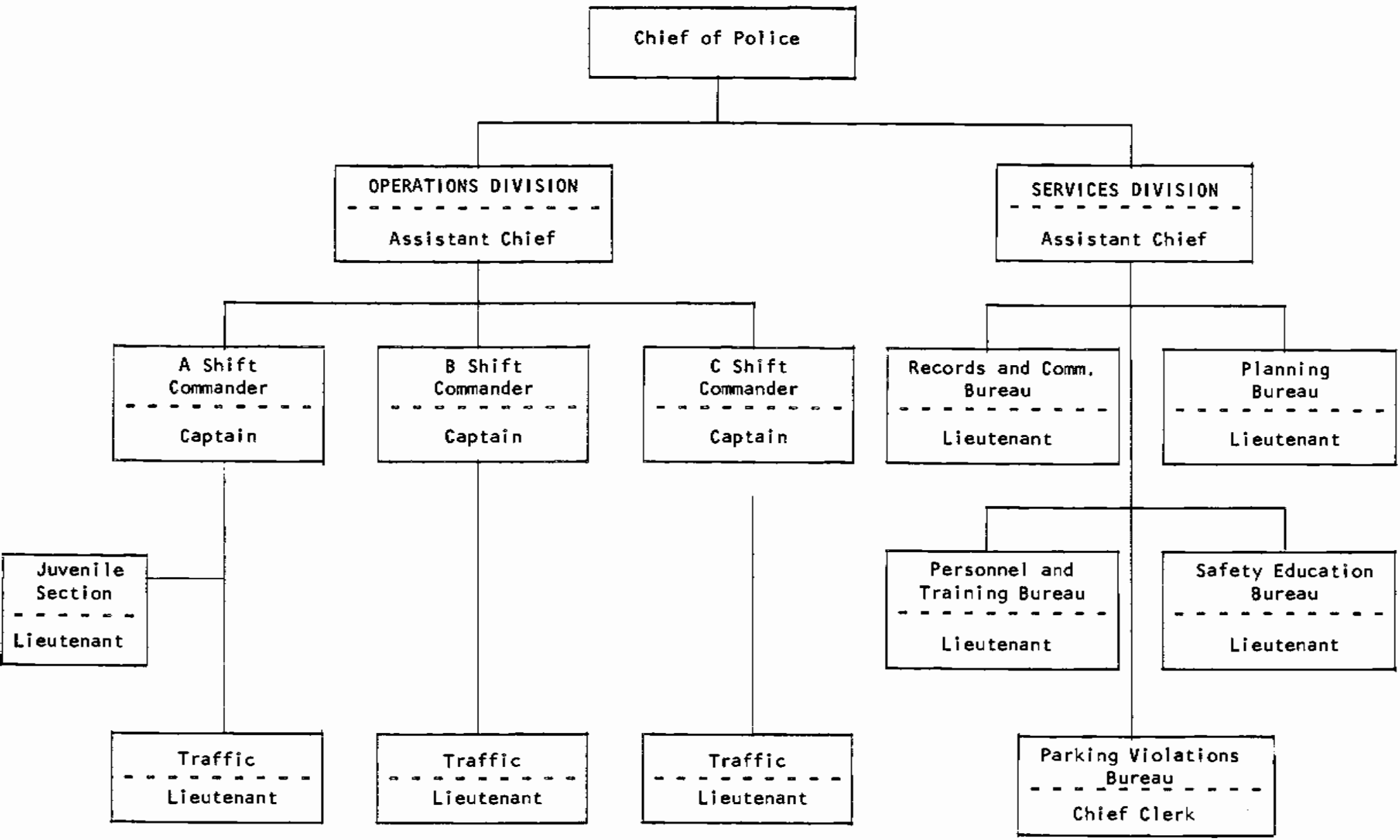

Prior to 1946, the records do not include the breakdown in all types of arrests, such as warrants served and, prior to 1944, a breakdown was not made of parking tickets to indicate whether issued to local or foreign violators.

During the year of 1941, the total number of traffic violations is exceptionally high for the reason that, during that year, a total of 1,224 violators were booked for brake and light inspection violations.

In the forepart of 1955, a new policy was established with reference to the serving of warrants, and all individuals who were served with a warrant were lodged in jail. On delinquent parking and moving violation tickets, a complaint is now filed in court and the violator notified to appear in court on a designated date, and the warrant not served as in the years prior to 1955. However, if the violator fails to appear in court as instructed, the warrant is then served and the violator is lodged in jail.

A more complete analysis of each type of arrest for the year of 1962 will be found elsewhere in this report.

REVIEW OF 1962 MOTOR VEHICLE TRAFFIC FATALITIES

No. 1

MOTOR VEHICLE - PEDESTRIAN

Date: Monday, January 15, 1962, at 6:15 P.M.

Location: 17th and M Streets.

Killed: MRS. MARIE K. MANCHESTER, age 80, 1720 M Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Mrs. Manchester was walking with a nephew, Lawrence Bate, crossing from the west side of 17th Street to the east side and had almost reached the east side of the street when a vehicle driven by Robert H. Douglas, age 67, of 2239 Dudley Street, making a left turn from M Street to proceed north on 17th Street, struck both pedestrians. The driver failed to see either pedestrian.

Both pedestrians were taken to the hospital, Lawrence treated for minor bruises and abrasions and released. Mrs. Manchester was severely injured and died in the hospital on March 9, 1962 from injuries sustained in this accident. Mr. Douglas was given a citation for failing to yield the right of way to a pedestrian.

No. 2

MOTOR VEHICLE - FIXED OBJECT

Date: Monday, March 5, 1962, at 2:04 A.M.

Location: Adams Street between 53rd and 54th.

Killed: GEORGE H. MUELLER, age 16, 1025 Groveland Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

George was alone in his vehicle, traveling west on Adams Street and, according to a witness, was accelerating the car very rapidly. He lost control of the vehicle, going up over the north curb of Adams and hitting a large tree. George was pinned in the vehicle, and it necessitated a wrecker pulling the front seat back so that George could be removed from the car. A friend of the victim's was in his own car and gave a statement to the police that George passed his car traveling at a high rate of speed and was fishtailing on the pavement.

George passed away at 3:14 A.M. in the hospital of severe head injuries with damage to the brain.

No. 3

Date: Monday, July 2, 1962, at 9:32 P.M.

Location: 48th Street between Walker and Leighton.

Killed: KRIS NELSON, age 7, 6740 Starr Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Kris had been playing with three other boys on the east side of 48th Street, shooting fireworks. Driver of the vehicle which struck Kris was Richard M. Baker, age 18, of 948 Carlos Drive, who was traveling approximately 20 miles an hour and did not see Kris until just at the point of impact. A friend of Richard's was riding in the right front seat of the car and gave the same story. Another witness who was standing in his front yard near the scene of the accident stated that the driver did not have a chance to stop before he hit the boy who was crossing 48th Street midblock between intersections, running hard and fast.

Kris was dead on arrival at the hospital. No citations were issued.

No. 4

MOTOR VEHICLE - MOTOR VEHICLE

Date: Wednesday, July 18, 1962 at 3:40 P.M.

Location: 14th and Cornhusker Highway.

Killed: MRS. FRANCES J. BURKE, age 49, 2120 O Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Mrs. Burke was a passenger in the right front seat of a vehicle driven by Lloyd H. Bond, age 37, of 2766 South 36th Street, which was northbound on 14th Street and did not stop for the stop sign protecting Cornhusker Highway. A semi-truck driven by Darrell Winchester, age 42, of 7301 Logan Street, traveling west on Cornhusker Highway, was struck by the Bond vehicle. The truck driver swerved to try to miss the Bond vehicle but could not avoid the accident.

Mrs. Burke passed away at 6:00 P.M. in the hospital of injuries sustained in this accident. It is the opinion of the investigating officers that Mr. Bond was under the influence of intoxicating liquors and had failed to stop at the stop sign. The charge of Motor Vehicle Homicide was filed against Mr. Bond.

No. 5

MOTOR VEHICLE - PEDESTRIAN

Date: Tuesday, August 28, 1962, at 3:34 P.M.

Location: 21st Street between Dudley and Holdrege.

Killed: DEBBIE TAYLOR, age 3, 1301 North 21st Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Edna Reed, age 47, 4236 North 70th Street, was traveling north on 21st Street when little Debbie ran from in front of a parked vehicle into the path of Mrs. Reed's car. Mrs. Reed could not stop in time to avoid hitting the little girl. Debbie had been playing with other children in the yard and ran out into the street midblock.

Debbie was killed instantly in this accident.

No. 6

MOTOR VEHICLE - FIXED OBJECT

Date: Sunday, September 23, 1962, at 1:46 A.M.

Location: 48th Street between Newton and Normal Blvd.

Killed: ANDREW MONIA, age 24, 4101 Touzalin Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Andrew was driving north on 48th Street and, just south of Newton Street, he lost control of the vehicle, sideswiping a power pole and hitting a tree. Riding with Andrew in the front seat were Edward Keech, age 23, 4101 Touzalin, and Robert Cave, age 23, 6520 Benton. Both passengers claimed to have been asleep until the vehicle started to fishtail. This was an Austin-Healey vehicle and Andrew's friends think that Andrew was unfamiliar with it. The driver and passengers had been drinking earlier in the evening and were returning from a dance out of town, according to the story of the passengers.

Andrew was killed instantly in this crash, with severe head injuries the cause of death. In the opinion of the investigating officers, too much speed and drinking set up and created this accident.

No. 7 and No. 8

Date: Thursday, November 8, 1962, at 12:29 A.M.

Location: West O Street between West 2nd Street and Salt Creek Bridge.

Killed: ALVIN TOOKE, age 17, 839 North 21st Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.
CAROLYN S. BOOTON, age 17, 435 South 12th Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Alvin Tooke was the driver of a car traveling west on O Street at a speed in excess of 70 miles per hour. The speed check was obtained by two detectives who were attempting to overtake and stop him. There were three passengers in the Tooke vehicle, Travis Gaters, age 21, of 427 North 20th, Mary Falcon, age 19, of 435 South 12th, and Richard Lee Wiedeman, age 18, 2219 Potter Street, who were seriously injured in this accident which occurred when Alvin drove left of the center line of the street and was in a head-on collision with a vehicle driven by Robert G. Christie, age 27, 1503 L Street. The impact of these two cars was so great that they reared up nose to nose and then came crashing down. Mr. Christie was alone in his vehicle and was also seriously injured.

Alvin was killed instantly and Carolyn died before an ambulance arrived at the scene. Chemical analysis proved that both of the drivers had been drinking. No citations were issued.

Killed: EDWARD D. PUTTY, age 17, 720 South 16th Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.
CHARLES T. COLE JR., age 20, 927 South 11th Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Edward Putty was the driver of a car traveling north on 10th Street at a high rate of speed. The story was told by a passenger, Robert L. Smith, age 16, of 1124 F Street, who was riding in the rear seat of the car, that Charles Cole made the statement that the "cops are after us, let's ditch them." Charles was a passenger in the front seat of the vehicle. According to Robert, the driver, Edward Putty, was traveling at an estimated speed of over 65 miles per hour and went to sleep at the wheel. Charles and Robert both grabbed the steering wheel in an attempt to get control of the vehicle. Robert says he saw the vehicle heading for the telephone pole and he threw himself face down behind the front seat, which saved his life. The vehicle sheared off the 10"-diameter telephone pole and then struck the three. Investigation disclosed that no police officers were in pursuit of this vehicle but Charles Cole had been identified as a probable prowler around a house about seventeen blocks south of the scene of the accident.

Charles Cole was killed instantly and Edward Putty passed away on the way to the hospital. Robert Smith was injured quite seriously.

MOTOR VEHICLE - TRAIN

Date: Saturday, December 15, 1962, at 10:59 A.M.

Location: Park Blvd. and Union Pacific Railroad tracks.

Killed: JOHN H. WARD, age 68, 1600 Smith Street, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Another Lincoln citizen's life was snuffed out in this accident at a very very dangerous railroad crossing. Mr. Ward was driving in a northeasterly direction on Park Blvd. and the Union Pacific train was traveling south. Fred Mitlowski, age 54, of Beatrice, Nebraska, the engineer of the train, reported that he whistled two long whistles, a short and then another long whistle, which is the standard procedure for trains at grade crossings, but evidently Mr. Ward did not hear the train whistle.

In 1961, two teenagers and a Lincoln minister were killed at this same crossing in separate accidents. There were no warning signals here at that time and the railroad officials had been ordered to install the red flashing signals. The signals had been installed but were not hooked up and were not functioning at the time of the Ward accident.

Mr. Ward was killed instantly in this crash.

SUMMARY OF THE 1962 TRAFFIC FATALITIES:

In summing up the nine fatal traffic accidents which took eleven lives on the streets of Lincoln, Nebraska during 1962, we find that speed played a very important part as a contributing cause.

Speed in itself does not kill. Speed increases the severity of the accident. Speed with combined negligence on the part of one or more drivers will kill almost every time. Four of the year's fatal accidents had the ingredient of excessive speed. Three of these four accidents had high speed with drivers losing control and hitting fixed objects after leaving the roadway. The other one of the four accidents with high speed resulted when the speeding vehicle crossed the center line and hit another vehicle head-on.

Three pedestrians were killed during 1962 and two of these pedestrians were children. Our children must be protected and we must expect the "unexpected" of our children. These two traffic victims were playing in the yards and ran out into the street without looking.

It is the responsibility of every citizen of Lincoln, whether he is a motorist or a pedestrian, to obey the laws and to set an example in safe driving and safe walking. After all, laws were made and enacted to protect us. Also, we should remember that every motorist is a pedestrian at one time or another.

Traffic accidents are costly. Let all of us work to prevent the mounting accident toll.

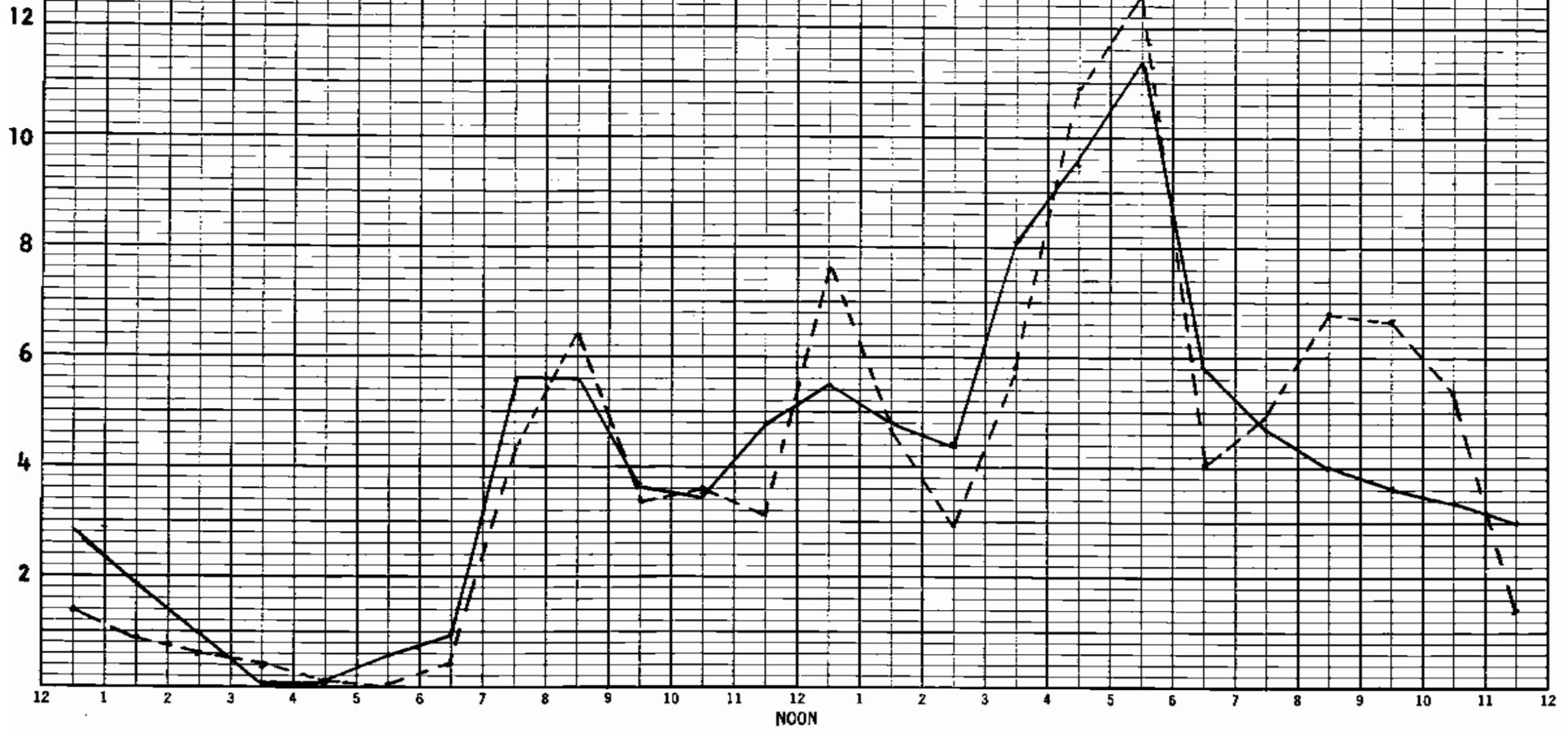

To discourage those violators who fail to make disposition of their parking violation tickets until they have received letters of reminder from this department, a policy was inaugurated in 1950 which provides that a parking violator shall pay a one-dollar penalty at the Violations Bureau if disposition is made within five days after issuance date of the ticket. After five days have elapsed, a two-dollar penalty is assessed for parking tickets. Seven days after date of issuance, if there is no disposition made of the ticket, a letter is sent to the owner of the vehicle as a reminder of the unpaid ticket. If no response is made to this warning, a warrant for court appearance is automatically issued 18 days after date of the ticket. Provisions were made in 1957 for the Violations Bureau to handle the disposition of tickets for "interfering with the use of the street," with a five-dollar penalty assessed within the five-day period and a seven-dollar penalty after the five days have elapsed.
