I am pleased to submit the Annual Report of the Lincoln Police Department for 2007. This Annual Report contains a record of the major events and accomplishments of the year, as well as the data and information that document our work. It is a longstanding tradition and has been produced in a remarkably similar format for the past 65 years, providing a valuable historical and statistical reference.

This year we faced the second consecutive year of very tight budgets for the City of Lincoln. Despite this, our personnel continued to deliver on our core mission: providing the quality police services that promote a safe and secure community. For the sixth consecutive year, the overall crime rate fell in Lincoln. The quality of services provided by our officers is evident in the over 90% satisfaction rating we received in our on-going Quality Service Audit from citizens who had recently received police services.

In a time of declining budgets, City government faces many challenges in providing the municipal services our residents depend upon. Challenge, however, is something this department constantly confronts and overcomes. This was evident in 2007; another very productive year punctuated by major events, cleared cases, and unparalleled efficiency by an undersized police force that rises to the task. I am immensely proud to serve with the women and men of this department.

On November 30, our executive secretary, Virginia Fischer, retired after 42 years of service spanning nine mayoral administrations and five police chiefs. Virginia exemplifies the spirit of the Lincoln Police Department, and is simply the finest colleague I have had the honor of working with. I am sure that all members of the department will join me in dedicating the 2007 Annual Report to her, and to all our valued retirees.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

JANUARY

Through Gang Investigator Dalton's efforts, one hundred fifty seven graffiti cases were cleared with the arrest of seven Lincoln teens. The vandals used marker and spray paint to tag names such as Pandemic, Youth Crew, Cola, AP3, Death Wish & Booger.

Nebraska's Concealed Handgun Permit Law went into effect on January 3rd. In the first month, 139 permits were issued across the state.

FEBRUARY

A school bus driver disarmed a knife-wielding man after he hopped on the bus, rambling. The bus driver was able to grab the knife, push the suspect down the steps and off the bus. Though the suspect fled the scene, Andrew Alvaro was later arrested for Disturbing the Peace.

Investigators quickly discovered that Robert Schwarte was responsible for a burglary at Valentino's To Go after they located his wallet on the floor where a safe had been stolen. He was later tied to fourteen other Lincoln burglaries.

MARCH

Human skeletal remains located on SW112th Street on January 26th were identified as Melissa Ann Schmidt. Melissa was reported missing in 1995, at the age of 15. Todd Baker later pled guilty to First Degree Murder and was sentenced to life in prison.

Officers arrested two men in the fatal stabbing of Jeremy Nguyen. The incident escalated from a disturbance following a traffic accident. Thoi Vo and Thanh Dinh were arrested for their involvement in the crime.

APRIL

Ricky E. Turco was arrested for manslaughter. He was the driver in a March 26th accident that caused the death of 15 year old Megan Churchill. Turco was sentenced to 10-14 years in prison.

This month marked the debut of Chief Casady's online blog: The Chief's Corner.

MAY

Officer Lashley used an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) to restart 14 year old, Kelsey McNeal's heart after she suffered cardiac arrest. He arrived to find her unresponsive and her parents performing CPR. It was the first successful use of an AED by an on-duty Lincoln Police Officer.

Douglas Maloley was charged with felony Leaving the Scene of an Accident and False Reporting after critically injuring five year old Molly Lanham as she walked to the school bus.

Officers participating in the Nebraska Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics ran through Lincoln as they carried the Special Olympics torch across the state to light the flame at Opening Ceremonies. Since the event began in 1985, over \$2.3 million dollars has been raised for Special Olympics Nebraska athletes alone.

JUNE

College students Joshua Milana and Morgan Hohnbaum were killed when a vehicle turned in front of their motorcycle at 84th Street & Havelock Avenue. Brett Griffin was lodged for Driving Under the Influence and Motor Vehicle Homicide.

The Lincoln/Lancaster County Narcotics Task Force found 59 marijuana plants growing in a southeast Lincoln home. The resident, Brian Wagner, was arrested following the service of a search warrant.

Carl Collins and Quentin Towns were arrested for thier involvement in a shooting in downtown Lincoln that left three people injured.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

JULY

Twenty one year old Megan Skrdlant was cited after abandoning her 11 hour old daughter at St.Elizabeth Regional Medical Center. The incident spurred citizens to contact lobbyists and council members in an effort to enact a “Safe Haven” law in Nebraska.

Lancaster County District Court Judge Chevront barred witnesses from using the words “rape”, “victim” and “assailant” in the trial of Pamir Safi - accused of sexually assaulting a UNL student. His ruling prompted nationwide protests in 40 cities.

AUGUST

Lucius Turner was located in Omaha and arrested for the robbery of Cattle National Bank & Trust on July 10th. Video surveillance from a nearby strip mall captured images of Turner’s vehicle which ultimately led to his arrest.

A fifteen year old boy was taken into custody for third degree sexual assault and assault after attacking a woman on the MoPac Trail.

SEPTEMBER

Benjamin Truska, a former Lincoln Public Schools Employee and church choir director, turned himself in following allegations of sexual assault to four boys. The incidents occurred over a ten year period.

Cesar Penado was arrested for 1st Degree Murder after officers found his ex-girlfriend, Maria Rosario Moreno deceased in her apartment. Penado tried to strangle her before using a knife to cut her throat.

OCTOBER

With the help of the SWAT Team, seventeen year olds Michael Nimox and Cleophus Collier were taken into custody for burglarizing Scheels All Sports. Of the 80 firearms stolen, 30 were recovered within 24 hours. By year end, four additional guns were recovered in the Phoenix, Arizona area. Jamael Gaines, Royal Guzman and Dominique Barton were also arrested for their involvement in the crime.

Lincoln police investigated the suspicious death of three month old Chase Daniel Madsen at Country Goose Child Development Home. The day care provider, Carla McKinney, was charged with Child Abuse resulting in Death.

NOVEMBER

Jeanette Hoer was arrested for manslaughter after her 75-year old roommate, James Girmscheid, died the day following an argument with her. It is believed that Hoer pushed Girmscheid, causing him to fall and hit his head on a coffee table. The death initially appeared accidental.

Lincoln Police Union’s Santa Cop Program raised a record breaking \$60,000 for the purchase of toys, games and clothing for underprivileged children.

After nearly two weeks in hiding, Derek Breazeale was located by Lincoln Police. He was wanted for escaping from a Kansas jail through the ductwork. Breazeale had been on a crime spree from Illinois to Kansas that began with burglaries in Lincoln.

DECEMBER


Lincoln Police investigated the homicide of Rhapsody Ziemann after her husband, Mark Ziemann, was arrested by Saline County authorities. It was discovered that he killed Rhapsody at her Lincoln apartment and later moved her body to a mobile home in Daykin, Nebraska.

E X E M P L A R Y P R O G R A M

I N N O V A T I V E B U R G L A R Y P R E V E N T I O N


Each year, Southeast Team police officers work hundreds of residential burglaries resulting in hundreds of thousands of dollars in loss to the victims. In many of these cases, the perpetrators didn't have to work to enter these homes, they simply walked in through an open garage door. About 25% of all residential burglaries involve an open garage door, a crime of opportunity that increases exponentially with good weather. Leaving your garage door open is an easy invitation for thieves to take golf clubs, bicycles, tools, the beer in the spare refrigerator, or the family van.

With that in mind, late shift Officers Keith White, Paul Aksamit, Tony Ortiz, John Hudec, Tim Abele, Eric Runge, Chad Hein, Alan Grell, and Jesse Hilger, led by Sergeant John Walsh developed a project to reduce the opportunity for this crime. The project is simple: during uncommitted time officers drive through the neighborhoods looking for open garage doors, when they find one they knock on the door, wake up the owner and educate them about the dangers of leaving the garage door open overnight. It's a great project that has a lasting effect, because when a police officer is talking to you on your front stoop at 3:00 a.m., it will cause you to double check your garage door before bedtime for the rest of your life.



L O C A T I O N S O F F I C E R S M A D E C O N T A C T

During Spring 2007, within a month and a half, these officers knocked on 101 doors in the Southeast Team area and the results speak for themselves. Open garage burglaries were down this year: from 80 at that point in 2006, to 54 in 2007. That is a one third reduction. This is an outstanding example of Southeast Team Officers seeing a problem and taking the initiative to educate the community and prevent these crimes from occurring.

EXEMPLARY PROGRAM

CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATION UNIT

The collection of forensic evidence in major case investigations presents some unique challenges for the department. Shrinking budgets and staffing issues make a full-time Crime Scene Unit prohibitive. LPD has partnered with other area agencies, including the Lancaster County Sheriff's office, the Nebraska State Patrol, and University of Nebraska-Lincoln Police to create a Crime Scene Investigation Unit to fulfill this need.

This unit trains once a month and all Crime Scene Investigators must pass a certification test. Members of the unit are called in when major case crime scenes need to be processed. The unit is staffed with a number of subject matter experts and is trained on everything from blood spatter to trace evidence collection. These officers and sergeants provide a level of expertise that meets and often surpasses the high standards required by modern criminal prosecutions.

The Crime Scene Investigation Unit, supervised by Sergeant Larry Barksdale, processed numerous crime scenes including homicides, robberies, suicides, officer involved shootings, and sexual assaults in the last year. All of its members are assigned to other full-time positions but they come together for training and call-outs periodically, sort of like a crime scene S.W.A.T. team.

QUALITY SERVICE AUDIT

Since 1993, the Lincoln Police Department has been participating in a survey to gauge citizen satisfaction with the delivery of police services. The Quality Service Audit was developed in conjunction with Gallup, Inc. and it continues to be a valuable tool for both officers and administrators. Officers hired after 1991 are designated as participants in the survey and receive feedback from citizens on their performance. The QSA is a telephone survey which is conducted by student interns and recruit officers. Contact is made with citizens who have had a recent police contact, whether they are a crime victim or the recipient of a traffic ticket. A sample of survey questions and the responses are listed below from the 3,044 surveys which were administered in 2007.



ORGANIZATIONAL CHART



The Lincoln Police Department's current organizational structure is comprised of three divisions. These divisions include the Management Division, Operations Division, and the Support Division. Chief of Police Thomas Casady commands the overall operation of the department and directly oversees the Management Division.

MANAGEMENT DIVISION



LEGAL ADVISOR

Assistant City Attorney Richard Anderson functions as the police legal advisor. His office provides legal advice to department staff, training to employees, and legal assistance to police officers during criminal investigations.

INTERNAL AFFAIRS

The Internal Affairs unit is staffed by Sgt. Geoff Marti. The Internal Affairs Sergeant works directly for the Chief of Police and conducts investigations and maintains records relating to employee conduct and complaints. The unit also provides information to the Citizen Police Advisory Board during quarterly meetings.

ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

Virginia Fischer provides a variety of support services to the Office of the Chief and the department as a whole and has done so for six police chiefs.

MANAGEMENT SERVICES UNIT

Captain Joy Citta is responsible for the inspections of all department units and is also the designated manager of the accreditation program.

INSPECTIONS

The Management Services Unit includes Inspections, Public Information, Technical Resources and Planning and Research. The Inspections Unit is responsible for maintenance of all General Orders, unit Standard Operating Procedure manuals, and compliance with accreditation standards.

TECHNICAL RESOURCES

Sergeant Todd Beam provides technical support to the department, manages the mobile data project and serves as a resource to the Community Teams. Sergeant Beam also researches, develops and implements programs relating to technological issues.

PLANNING AND RESEARCH

Sergeant Don Scheinost is the planning officer for the Lincoln Police Department. He is responsible for grant administration, statistical analysis, program development, and accreditation.

PUBLIC INFORMATION



OPERATIONS DIVISION


Assistant Chief James Peschong commands the Operations Division and is responsible for Community Police Teams and Operations Support.

Two thousand seven proved to be a very successful year for the Center Team. We faced many significant challenges managing staffing needs and other resources, and yet the Center Team showed a reduction in overall Part I crimes and an increase in the clearance rate. This type of effort is largely due to the professionalism and dedication of Center Team officers.

The Lincoln downtown area is host to many large events, including but not limited to Cornhusker football games, concerts, the Haymarket Farmer's Market, Jazz in June, Ribfest, the StarCity Parade, and many others. These events bring large numbers of people and associated traffic to the downtown area. An emphasis has been placed on managing large events and managing City resources in a cost effective manner. Center Team was very successful in meeting that goal.

This year also saw an increased emphasis on the enforcement of liquor laws in the downtown area. These efforts help the downtown liquor establishments exist alongside a large population of students from the University and a growing population of people residing in the downtown. Overall, Lincoln is a safe and peaceful place to live. Acting in cooperation with several Lincoln community entities, we are working to keep it that way on the Center Team.

Located at the corner of 27th and Holdrege, the Center Team station sits squarely in the middle of the Clinton, Hartley, and Malone neighborhoods and the North 27th Street Business District. Having responsibility for these neighborhoods, in addition to the downtown area is our privilege and our challenge. Center Team is truly the "heart" of Lincoln.

NORTHEAST TEAM

January 2008 marked the one year anniversary to the opening of the new Northeast Team Station at 4843 Huntington Avenue. Over and above the police work, this past year was spent adjusting to our new surroundings and “working out the bugs” always associated with a physical move and change of facilities. To establish, normalize and maintain ongoing police operations from the new location was a major goal this year. I am happy to report success.

The central location, coupled with the convenience of the new stand alone police station has reaped benefits for the citizens of Northeast Lincoln and the City as a whole. We feel we are positioned well to serve Northeast Lincoln in the new building. Our efficiency seems to have been enhanced dramatically since the move from downtown. This efficiency is the most pronounced at shift change. We no longer need to travel the miles back and forth to police headquarters, which saves time and resources. Most notably, the Northeast Police Team consumed nearly 6,000 gallons less gasoline during the past year. This savings was directly related to the advantages of the new location and doesn’t take into account the additional savings in vehicle mileage.

Our success this past year was not limited to a new location and efficiency. The Northeast Team established a 33.95% clearance rate for Part I crimes during the 2007 fiscal year. The Part I designation includes the most serious crimes we investigate. This speaks well of the quality of police work on the team which is gratifying considering the projected goal of a 25% clearance rate at the beginning of the year. Traffic accidents decreased slightly this past year, while narcotics arrests on the Team increased approaching 30% over our projected enforcement levels.

All of the accomplishments this past year occurred during a period of staffing challenges which saw greater demands on our available time. I’m happy to say that, in spite of the difficulties, success was achieved and progress made.

NORTHWEST TEAM

The Northwest Team was presented with a variety of neighborhood challenges in 2007. Due to the diverse make up found in the Northwest Team's neighborhoods, our officers confronted many police related issues by tailoring their approach in developing specific Community Based Problem Oriented Projects to a particular neighborhood. The North Bottoms Neighborhood is a mix of owner occupied residences and rental properties, many occupied by university students. The team officers addressed police issues stemming from parking violations and speeders. As a result of the Nebraska Football Game Day the neighborhood experienced violations of parking, public consumption, minor in possession, and wild parties. To impact these issues a POP Project was coordinated resulting in officers writing 44 parking citations, 13 vehicles were towed, 5 MIP arrests and 33 cited for Public Consumption.

With the annexation of the State Fair Grounds the team was presented with issues specific to the parking areas which surround the Devaney Center and the Ice Box Facility. Many of the Larceny from Auto incidents were occurring during night events at the facilities. To affect a reduction in larcenies officers covertly patrolled the parking area gathering intelligence on vehicles that seemed to be lingering in the lots. Through follow up investigation on the intelligence obtained suspects were developed and later arrested for a number of offenses.

In addition to the neighborhoods and business areas, the Northwest Team has a substantial community at Northstar High School. Officer Vicki Bourg, the School Resource Officer for Northstar manages the daily needs of approximately 1200-1300 students. Officer Bourg not only serves as the police officer for Northstar, she's also part of the school leadership team that's charged with improving the effectiveness of the Positive Behavior Support Plan.

During the weekend of June 22-24, 2007 the State Fairgrounds was the hosting venue for the Power-up Bike Rally, featuring the Teutal Family from the Orange County Chopper television show. Officers provided security and crowd control through out the weekend. The LPD Traffic Unit also led a celebrity motorcycle ride to Malcolm and back.

SOUTHEAST TEAM

Throughout the year Southeast Team officers look for opportunities to problem solve with the community on various issues. During the course of these contacts we hope to educate the public on how to prevent or reduce crime. The following are a few examples of community policing Southeast Team style:

In 2006, Southeast Team officers responded to 403 loud party calls. These types of complaints are not only disruptive to a neighborhood when they are occurring, but if left unabated can lead to decline in property values and in some cases can become a blighting influence. Sergeants John Walsh and Tom Ward kicked off a year long project in January of 2006 to see if they could reduce the number of loud party calls on the Southeast Team. These sergeants knew that by an overwhelming majority these calls occur in rental properties and felt that if they could engage and educate the property owners, they could have an impact. In 2007, each time a citation was issued as the result of a loud party a letter was generated to the landlord, which informed them of the violation at their property, and asked for their cooperation to prevent future calls. During the year long project, 42 letters were sent resulting in 94 fewer loud party calls in 2007.

In May, Officers Josh White and Tim Abele teamed up to promote bicycle safety and security tips for children at the Children's Zoo annual "Safety Day". These officers collaborated with Blues Bike & Fitness and the Lincoln Police Union Charities to purchase 50 bike locks to give to children during the event. In addition to educating kids about bike safety and theft prevention, these officers took the opportunity to talk to the kids about summer safety.

In the fall of this year, the Southeast Team investigated a series of apartment complex burglaries with a common thread; entry into the apartments was made by prying open the sliding patio doors. In an effort to impact these offenses Officers Joe Yindrick, Matt Tangen and Spencer Behrens developed a project focused on education and prevention. They contacted managers at 22 large apartment complexes, to make sure they were aware of the pattern. They handed out over 100 informational fliers for posting at entryways and communal mailboxes. Some complexes publish tenant newsletters, and included this information in the next issue. The information provided included the advice of a bar in the door track-- something several complexes make available for their residents. The Southeast Team also beefed up patrol time in these complexes, as workload allowed. In addition, the information was shared with news media, and several stories highlighting prevention resulted. In the six weeks prior to the project, 24 of these burglaries occurred. In the six weeks after, there were 8. On Matt, Spencer, and Joe's beat, where they did the door-to-door work, these burglaries fell from 9 to 2. The results are impressive.

The Southwest Team experienced a change in leadership in 2007. Captain Bob Wilhelm retired from the department after 32 years of service and Captain Mike Woolman was assigned as his replacement in June of 2007. Captain Wilhelm was very respected by members of the department and community and will be greatly missed.

The Southwest Team became the second team to transition to twelve hour shifts. Many officers prefer working a twelve hour shift and recommended that the team continue to operate on a 12 hour schedule throughout 2008.

The Southwest Team continues to be the busiest and most active team in the city with neighborhood problems ranging from prostitution, narcotics and sex crimes to robberies, assaults, and wild parties.

The Southwest Team continues to focus on the neighborhood improvement projects by working closely with members of the community. Our primary objective is to provide quality services to the community by building strong relationships with the community members. We also continue to work closely with our neighborhood associations to deal with their specific neighborhood problems.

Officers on the Southwest Team were involved in numerous projects to impact crime. Sergeant Bassett, Officer Schreiner and Officer Schultz worked together to impact the prostitution problem that continues in our Everett and Near South Neighborhoods. The Officers made over 30 arrests for prostitution and pandering in 2007. Officers B. Ward and Officer Stumbo were involved in a project to impact sex related crimes in Wilderness Park which resulted in ten arrests. Southwest Night Shift Officers were also very successful in DWI enforcement making 456 arrests in 2007.

The Sergeants, Officers, and the Public Service Officer on the Southwest Team are extremely dedicated and a pleasure to work with. In 2008 the Southwest Team will continue to work with neighborhood groups, other city agencies, landlords, and community activists to impact crime in the Near South and Everett Neighborhoods. We look forward to the challenge and the opportunity to dramatically change the quality of life in these historic and valued neighborhoods.


TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT UNIT

The Traffic Enforcement Unit is commanded by Captain David Beggs. The Unit is currently staffed with six officers. These officers specialize in enforcing traffic laws throughout the City.

The priority of the unit is contacting drivers of motor vehicles who violate traffic laws, with special attention given to school zones, construction zones, and arterial roadways. The officers in the unit also work to resolve special problems in residential neighborhoods. The Traffic Unit has the ability to perform traffic and speed studies in problem areas. Some of the major projects conducted by the Traffic Unit throughout the year are; Spring and Fall School Zone Selective, Spring and Fall America Buckles Up Children Campaign and the Red Light Running Project.

Members of the Traffic Unit also serve on the following committees: Safe Kids/Safe Communities Coalition and the Safety Training Option Program. Officers of the Unit also assist by giving traffic safety presentations to students at various driver education programs throughout the City.

In addition to the traffic related duties, this unit is responsible for the investigation of serious injury and fatality motor vehicle accidents. Investigator Marlan Hohnstein, one of the six officers assigned to the Unit is the lead Accident Reconstructionist for the team. The six members of the Reconstruction Team are highly trained and use specialized equipment to complete the investigation and forensic mapping of traffic crash scenes. Investigator Hohnstein and Investigator Robert Hurley are both certified by the Accreditation Commission for Traffic Accident Reconstruction (ACTAR). The quality of work produced by this Team is some of the finest in the country.



CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS TEAM

Case detectives and investigators are assigned to work with Community Police Team officers on Lincoln's most significant crimes against persons and property. The Criminal Investigations Team is fortunate to have two polygraph examiners whom assist with investigations and pre-employment interviews. Specialized units, listed below, help to complete the team.

White collar crime, vice and confidential investigations are performed by the Technical Investigations Unit. Sergeant Mark Meyerson supervises investigations focusing on checks and fraud.

FAMILY CRIMES UNIT

Under the direction of Sergeant Mark Unvert, the Family Crimes Unit investigates missing juveniles and serious crimes against children. The unit reviews reports of domestic violence and child abuse/neglect to ensure that sufficient information and evidence are gathered. Family Crimes also operates a diversion program for juvenile offenders, coordinates youth programs and maintains gang and truancy intervention programs.

NARCOTICS UNIT

The Narcotics Unit is an interagency task force composed of officers from the Lincoln Police Department, Lancaster County Sheriff's Office and the University of Nebraska Police Department. The Narcotics Unit works cooperatively with several other State and Federal agencies. Supervised by Captain Brian Jackson, the members of the unit conduct investigations into drug trafficking and other drug law violations. A gang analyst is also assigned to the unit.

In 2007, the Narcotics Unit investigated 804 cases, resulting in 402 felony arrests and 207 misdemeanor arrests. These investigations led to the seizure of over \$1, 137, 000.00 in illegal substances and property.

EDUCATION AND PERSONNEL UNIT




VICTIM/WITNESS UNIT

The Victim/Witness Unit is administered by JoAnna Briggs. The unit provides information and support services to victims and witnesses of crime. The Information Technology Unit is directed by Clair Lindquist. The unit develops computer applications and provides technical support to all department personnel. The department's computer-based records system is maintained by Information Services.

PROPERTY & EVIDENCE UNIT

The Property and Evidence Unit is supervised by Pamela Fittje. The unit is responsible for maintaining custody of all seized evidence, coordinating the acquisition of property, distributing equipment and supplies, and monitoring department inventory.




CRIME ANALYSIS






