LETTER from the CHIEF

Mayor Beutler, City Council members, Citizens of Lincoln.

I am pleased to present the 2012 Annual Report. In this report you will find comprehensive information and statistics related to the Lincoln Police Department. I want to thank each and every member of the Lincoln Police Department and the citizens of Lincoln for working cooperatively to achieve our successes in 2012.

In 2012 the department saw an increase in our violent crimes of rape (5.9%) and robbery (12.5%). While forcible rape has seen an increase across the state, the department aggressively works on this issue. We continue to provide more advanced training for personnel, provide more avenues for victims to report these crimes and we have strengthened our response protocols. Our largest growth in violent crime has been in the area of robberies. This continues to be a concern for us. Many of these robberies have an association with narcotics activity. The use of illegal drugs has an impact on the crime in our city. Unfortunately, it is something that we constantly battle with.

The department continues to strive to find efficiencies while providing quality service. This past year we combined our Service Desk operations with the Emergency Communications Center. This move has provided us with a more timely response, more qualified staff to perform a variety of jobs, as well as greater career growth and opportunities for personnel.

Our 2012 Annual Report also highlights the department's major goals:

Through our strong police/community partnership, we have once again successfully achieved these goals. In fact, our Quality Service Audit shows that citizens feel significantly safer and secure in their neighborhoods than over the previous ten years.

These are just a few examples of the many accomplishments of the department that you will read about in this report. I am extremely proud of the dedicated women and men of the Lincoln Police Department who will continue to carry us into the future.

THE YEAR in Review

Tanuary

- Our department grieved the sudden loss of Officer Tony Howe, an investigator with our Criminal Investigations Unit. He was fatally injured in an automobile accident, in York County, on his way to work.
- Police investigated the death of 1 year old Zachary Taylor. He was found unresponsive at a caregiver's home. He later died from a skull fracture and brain bleed. No one has been arrested in his death.

February

• A graduation and awards ceremony was held to honor 6 recruits graduating from the academy and to recognize the outstanding efforts of veteran officers and civilians.

March

- Three men, one armed with a gun, robbed the Great Western Bank in Havelock. All three, Cleophus Collier, Trenton Ziegenbein and Darrius Mason, were arrested within 10 hours of the crime. Five others also faced charges for their involvement in the robbery.
- A man walking his dog in a wooded area near SW 1st and West South Streets discovered human skeletal remains. The remains were later identified as 59 year old transient, Raymundo Garcia.
- Two adults, 19 year old Andrew Walker and 23 year old Ashley Jackson, were arrested after 12 year old Serena Garrett died from an accidental drug overdose while babysitting at Ashley Jackson's home.
- A 26 year old woman, Kinley Queen, turned herself in following a hit and run accident that killed a 40 year old male pedestrian crossing North Antelope Valley Parkway.



April

• Troy L. Smith arrested for Terroristic Threats after making a phone call on March 29th that was determined to be a hoax. Multiple agencies responded to his claim of a house fire, with one woman shot and a child in danger.

May

 After 7 months of protest, the Occupy Lincoln encampment was cleared to make way for renovations to Centennial Mall.

Tune

- US Bank's Edgewood location was robbed by a lone gunman. This was the first of two Lincoln bank robberies committed by 51 year old Cameron Mitchell.
- Kelly Hall was arrested for Leaving the Scene of an Injury Accident and DUI after she struck and killed a 53 year old pedestrian crossing Cornhusker Highway.

THE YEAR in Review

Tuly

- Shots were fired during a confrontation over a hit and run accident, leaving 41 year old Orlando Sifuentez fatally injured. The County Attorney's Office declined to charge the shooter, who had been acting in self-defense.
- A man entered the Liberty First Credit Union, demanding money via a handwritten note. The note was later processed for fingerprints, revealing 24 year old Billy Rayvon Johnson as the person responsible.
- A robbery was reported at a Union Bank & Trust in southwest Lincoln. Cameron Mitchell was later apprehended. His female acquaintance, Ruth Cecetka, was arrested as an accessory.
- A 19 year old man, Naif Al-Kazahy, was shot during a disturbance with a group of individuals near 14th & Sumner Streets. Zachary Neuberger was arrested for 2nd degree Murder. Two others were arrested for Accessory to a Felony.

August

- ► Due to drought conditions, the City began a month-long water restriction. Officers issued more than 400 citations.
- An argument in northeast Lincoln led to the fatal stabbing of 30 year old Benjamin Miller. Joshua Albright was arrested at the scene and charged with 2nd degree Murder.
- An arrest warrant was issued for 33 year old Charlie Rogers after an extensive investigation reveled the hate crime she reported was false. She was later sentenced to 7 days jail, 2 years probation, 250 hours of community service and a psychological evaluation.

September

• An alert Park & Go employee provided vehicle and credit card information which led to the arrest of 24 year old Kirk Reisetter for bank robbery. On September 6, 2012, Kirk Reisetter robbed the Nebraska Bank of Commerce in downtown Lincoln.

October

- Staffing and responsibilities of the Service Desk Unit merged with the Emergency Communications Center as the ECC moved from the City's Finance Department to a unit within LPD.
- An 18 year old man, Shahbaz Mohammad. was apprehended after he fled from a traffic stop, dragging two officers. At one point speeds reached an estimated 90-100 MPH.

November

• Increase in business robberies with 8 reported in just 8 days.

December

• One man shot and two others stabbed outside a Christmas party at the Welfare Social Hall.



EXEMPLARY Programs

In 2012, the Lincoln Police Department's Victim/Witness Unit recognized a significant milestone – celebrating 30 years of assistance to crime victims. There are no other victim assistance programs in Lancaster County that serve the diverse victim population that the Lincoln Police Department Victim/Witness Unit serves. The unit reaches out to victims of all crime types whether there is an arrest or not. Letters are sent to over 8,000 victims per year and over 2,000 victims are personally contacted. There are currently four advocates working in the unit with collectively over 70 years of experience. Through the years, the advocates and volunteers have contributed countless hours and empathy, providing much needed outreach. The unit manager, JoAnna Briggs, began volunteering for the unit in 1982 and has 30 years of experience in the field.

Historically, the victim have been the forgotten party in the criminal justice system. The system focuses first on the crime itself and, thereafter, on the offender. Reform efforts have generally excluded the victims of crime. Victims may need to repeat their statements, look at mug shots, face their attacker or wonder what may happen if the case never comes to trial. All of this asks a great deal of the victim and offers very little. Yet, it is the evidence provided by the victim that makes it possible to identify, apprehend, prosecute, and convict the offender.



Victim/Witness Unit

The Victim/Witness Unit advocates provide timely assistance to victims about case status, crisis intervention and referrals, not only when an arrest is made, but also for those victims when there is no arrest on the case or the perpetrator has not been contacted. On a regular basis advocates are asked to assist victims with protection order applications or to accompany a victim to court.

The Lincoln Police Department Victim/Witness Unit offers ways of improving the attitude of victims and witnesses toward the Criminal Justice System and provide for a faster and more complete recovery by the victim from the effects of the crime. We are fortunate and grateful to have an amazing group of individuals assist with bringing closure and comfort to those affected by crime.

EXEMPLARYPrograms

In mid-2011, the Lincoln Police Department started implementing more two officer cruisers into its arsenal of single person patrol units. The change was originally explored for officer efficiency and as a cost saving option due to increased gas prices. The concept also made more sense as a way to take advantage of the proliferation in data and technology available at officers' fingertips. Government budgets require police departments to examine methods for cost savings while continuing to provide quality services that promote a safe and secure community. Moving to more two person cruisers was simply an option our department was willing to explore. This decision has been met with positive responses at both the administrative level and the street level.

Initially, each of the five community police teams was assigned one two officer cruiser. They were scheduled during second and third shifts, when officers were more likely to respond to calls requiring back up. It worked so well the first year that the Southwest Team has increased to three separate two officer units. One officer involved in the project commented that the advantages have far surpassed his expectations. He said, "Most every aspect of our job has become easier, more fun, and safer." With one officer driving, the other officer can use the mobile data computer to access reports, criminal contacts, maps and address histories. "This has become a valuable tool. We often find ourselves approaching people and situations differently because we know who/what we are dealing with going in." He added that having the passenger officer look up information en route to the call "has allowed both us and our beat buddies to avoid some potentially bad situations."



Two Officer Cruisers

Keep in mind this isn't a new concept in policing. The Lincoln Police Department actually used two officer cruisers up until the mid-late 1970s. In the 1980s, police departments across the country followed a trend toward single officer patrol cars. It was based on the theory that splitting two-officer units into separate cars, police agencies were able to effectively double the area of patrol coverage. Also, the sight of more police cars on patrol translated into a public perception of heightened police presence. We are now trending toward safety and efficiency. Officer Justin Roach summarized, "I have noticed that we can work any call assigned twice as fast (if not faster) with the same quality as a single unit. I came into this thinking that it would be a fun thing to try, but I am quickly seeing that this is a much safer and more efficient way of doing business for street cops."

In the coming years, even more two person cruiser patrols may be put into action. During the process, we will assess the needs of the department and the city as a whole. Maintaining quality police services remains a top priority for us and the community. As the city grows and technology evolves, we will continue to examine new concepts to provide the citizens with the quality services they deserve.

Since 1993, the Lincoln Police Department has been participating in a survey to gauge citizen satisfaction with the delivery of police services. The Quality Service Audit was developed in conjunction with Gallup, Inc. and it continues to be a valuable tool for both officers and administrators. Officers hired after 1991 are designated as participants in the survey and receive feedback from citizens on their performance. The QSA is a telephone survey which is conducted by student interns, volunteers and recruit officers. Contact is made with citizens who have had a recent police contact, whether they are a crime victim or the recipient of a traffic ticket. A sample of survey guestions and the responses are listed below from the 3,462 surveys administered in 2012.


How would you rate the officer's overall performance in this situation?

MANAGEMENT Division

LEGAL ADVISOR

Assistant City Attorney Tonya Peters functions as the police legal advisor. Her office provides legal advice to department staff, training to employees, and legal assistance to police officers during criminal investigations.

INTERNAL AFFAIRS

The Internal Affairs unit is staffed by Sgt. Mark Domangue. The Internal Affairs Sergeant works directly for the Chief of Police and conducts investigations and maintains records relating to employee conduct and complaints. The unit also provides information to the Citizen Police Advisory Board during quarterly meetings.

ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

JJ Mayer, a valued employee since 1997, provides a variety of support services to the Office of the Chief and to the department as a whole.



CAPTAIN CITTA

MANAGEMENT SERVICES

Managed by Captain Joy Citta, the Management Services Unit includes Inspections, Public Information, Technical Resources and Planning and Research. The Inspections Unit is responsible for maintenance of all General Orders, Standard Operating Procedure manuals and compliance with accreditation standards.

TECHNICAL RESOURCES

Sergeant Todd Beam and his staff provide technical support to the department, manage the mobile data project and serve as a resource to the Community Teams. They also researches, develops and implements programs relating to technological issues.


PLANNING AND RESEARCH

The Operations Support Unit is staffed by six Captains who serve as Duty Commanders. The Duty Commander manages all police operations during the shift. Other command officers, including the Chief of Police and Assistant Chief, serve as Duty Commanders when regularly assigned Duty Commanders are not available. This unit is able to provide 24 hour command services to all police field operations. In addition to this regular assignment, several duty commanders also organize special teams such as the Traffic Enforcement Unit, coordinate planning related to disaster preparedness and oversee mental health investigations.

For many years, canines have proven to be a valuable resource to the Lincoln Police Department. Our police service dogs perform a variety of duties including suspect tracks, building searches, drug detection and open-area searches. In 2012 alone, the dogs participated in 344 calls - including 96 tracks and 116 narcotic searches. Their involvement led to 99 misdemeanor arrests and 40 felony arrests.

2012 Highlights

In July, Officer John Clarke and Remo assisted the Metro Area Fugitive Task Force in locating Reuben Reyes. Reyes, who had evaded arrest for several weeks, was being sought for felony assault and weapons charges. John and the task force encountered Reyes on a street and Reyes ran from the contact. John deployed Remo who physically apprehended Reyes without further incident. Additionally, John and Remo accompanied the SWAT team on nine deployments, assisted the Metro Area Fugitive Task Force with fourteen investigations and seized nearly \$38,000 in cash for the Narcotics Unit.

Officer Tyler Dean and Kony were responsible for nearly \$40,000 in cash seizures in 2012. In April, Kony tracked a suspect, wanted for assault and other charges, hiding behind a boat. In September, a man with a lengthy criminal history and a dislike of law enforcement, was contacted on a traffic stop. He ran from the scene, resisted arrest and was ultimately taken into custody with the use of a TASER. Kony assisted in tracking the uncooperative man as he eluded officers.

In January, a traffic stop resulted in 6 arrests after Officer Nikki Loos And Dexter successfully tracked the suspect who ran from the stop. Later that same month, Dexter tracked from a burglary—leading directly to the suspect's house, where the suspect was located along with the stolen property. In April, Officer Loos and Dexter located a man responsible for a home invasion robbery, resulting in two felony arrests. Officer Loos and Dexter assisted the Lancaster County Sheriff's Office in May, during the investigation of a hit and run accident. Dexter tracked the party, who was found sleeping.

Officer Jeff Urkevich and Jake had a productive year—together they found nearly\$22,000 in narcotics, logged 44 misdemeanor arrests and 25 felony arrests. In January, they successfully captured several individuals following a vehicle pursuit. In April, a suspect robbed a Russ's Market employee at knifepoint. Officer Urkevich and Jake tracked the man to a backyard, where he refused to come out. With the elevated danger of an armed suspect, Jake was deployed for apprehension. After meeting Jake, the man was taken into custody without incident. In July, Officer Urkevich and Jake assisted in locating an individual wanted for numerous charges, including felony domestic assault and false imprisonment. In November, a suspect in a jewelry store burglary was located by Jake, following a foot pursuit with officers.

In February, Officer Vollmer and Brix assisted in apprehending an escapee from the correctional facility. The man escaped over a chain link fence, making comments that he would not be going back to jail. Officer Vollmer and Brix located the fugitive, hiding in a backyard. He was apprehended after a short foot chase.




TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT Unit

The Traffic Enforcement Unit is commanded by Captain David Beggs and supervised by Sergeant Sam Santacroce. The Unit is currently staffed with eight officers. These officers specialize in enforcing traffic laws throughout the City.

The priority of the unit is contacting drivers of motor vehicles who violate traffic laws, with special attention given to school zones, construction zones, and arterial roadways. The officers in the unit also work to resolve special problems in residential neighborhoods. The Traffic Unit deploys the "Speed Trailer" and has the ability to perform traffic and speed studies in problem areas. The Unit receives grant assistance from the Nebraska Office of Highway Safety to help its programs achieve success. Some of the major projects conducted by the Traffic Unit throughout the year are: Spring and Fall School Zone selective, Red Light Running Project and National Click It or Ticket Mobilization.

Members of the Traffic Unit also serve on the following committees: Safe Kids/Safe Communities Coalition, Safety Training Option Program, City Transportation Liaison and I80 Incident Management. Members of the Unit also assist by giving traffic safety presentations to students at various driver education programs throughout the City. Motor escorts are provided by the unit throughout the year, including the Torch Run for Special Olympics and the Lincoln Marathon.

In addition to the traffic related duties, this unit is responsible for the investigation of serious injury and fatality motor vehicle accidents. Investigator Todd Kocian is the lead Accident Reconstructionist for the department. Five other investigators from the various police teams comprise the balance of the six member Reconstruction Team. They are highly trained and use specialized equipment to complete the investigation and forensic mapping of traffic crash scenes, on top of their normal assignments. Investigators Todd Kocian, Mike Muff and Derek Dittman are certified by the Accreditation Commission for Traffic Accident Reconstruction (ACTAR). The quality of work produced by this team is some of the finest in the country.

SPEC I ALTY Functions

Crime Scene Technicians

Crime scene technicians have developed specific expertise in order to process major crime scenes. In today's world of technology forensic evidence is becoming more and more important to processing crime scenes. In order to maintain proficiency, the unit trains, at a minimum, nine times a year.

Field Force

The Lincoln Police Department maintains a Field Force to provide an organized response to actual or potential disturbances caused by large groups of disorderly persons which cannot be safely resolved by standard response techniques.

Honor Guard

The Lincoln Police Department recognizes the need to maintain an Honor Guard consisting of Lincoln Police Department commissioned officers to participate in ceremonial events enhancing the image of the Department or to honor/memorialize a distinguished person or group.

Lincoln Metro Clan Lab Team

This team, consisting of members of LPD, Nebraska State Patrol and Lancaster County Sheriff's Office, assures an organized and well-planned response to the dismantling and collection of evidence at suspected methamphetamine clandestine laboratory operations.

Marksmanship/Pistol Team

The Marksmanship Team was established to increase officer awareness of good marksmanship and provide an incentive for officers to attain their maximum potential with side arms. The team travels to compete against other law enforcement agencies across the country.


School Resource Officers

VICTIM/WITNESS

The Victim/Witness Unit is administered by JoAnna Briggs. The unit provides information and support services to victims and witnesses of crime. The mission of the Victim/ Witness Unit is to help victims deal with the effects of crime. The unit utilizes extensive volunteer resources to assure that victims and witnesses are provided with the information and assistance that they need.



POLICE GARAGE

Fleet Manager Pat Wenzl directs the operation of the department's fleet and garage facility. He is responsible for acquiring, up-fitting, repairing, maintaining, and replacing all department vehicles and pieces of equipment. Other light duty city-owned vehicles are also managed by the police garage.



FORENSIC UNIT

Erin Sims supervises the activities of the Forensic Unit. The unit conducts fingerprint examinations and maintains AFIS (Automated Fingerprint Identification System). In addition, members of the unit perform document examinations and maintain the department's photography lab.



EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS

Julie Righter manages employees trained to handle a variety of police, sheriff, fire and medical emergencies. They are responsible for receiving, prioritizing, and sending appropriate assistance to the citizens of Lincoln and Lancaster County. In addition, the dispatchers provide callers with emergency medical dispatch instructions when needed.

The unit, managed by Pam Fittje, is responsible for maintaining the custody of all seized evidence, processing abandoned vehicles and bicycles, ordering and distributing department supplies and equipment.



FINANCE

Michele Selvage supervises the payroll and accounting activities of the department. The unit is responsible for the management of financial accounts, and the payroll for department employees.



RECORDS UNIT

Heather Baker coordinates the efforts of the Records Unit which processes and maintains all case files, disseminates reports and criminal history information. The Records Unit must ensure that cases are cleared following the Uniform Crime Reporting guidelines. A public counter is staffed to assist citizens with obtaining permits and providing information such as copies of criminal histories. incident reports and mug shots.



CRIME ANALYSIS

Criminal intelligence information is maintained and disseminated by the Crime Analysis Unit. The unit also manages the Crime Stopper's program, crime mapping, pawn entries, and a variety of other data entry functions. The unit documents and analyzes crime patterns and trends. Andrew Dasher coordinates the unit which also provides an on-line summary of significant cases worked by officers.

Office Assistant Karen Cates Captain Jon Sundermeier commands the Criminal Investigations Team. The team provides support and assistance to the Community Police Teams, conducts specialized investigations and coordinates follow-up investigation of major crimes. Case detectives and investigators are assigned to work with Community Police Team officers on Lincoln's most significant crimes against persons and property. The Criminal Investigations Team is fortunate to have access to two polygraph examiners whom assist with investigations and pre-employment interviews. Specialized units help to complete the team.

Technical Investigations

The Technical Investigations Unit is supervised by Sergeant Sandy Myers. The primary mission of the Unit is to enforce city, state, and federal laws by working with law enforcement and other agencies. The secondary mission is crime prevention by education. TIU is responsible for investigating white collar crime, frauds, forgeries, credit card thefts, liquor and vice, keno, abuse of vulnerable adults, embezzlements, counterfeiting, perjury and highly confidential investigations.

Electronic Crimes

The Electronic Crimes Unit is supervised by Sergeant John Donahue. The primary mission of the unit is to support all investigations involving acquisition, preservation and analysis of electronic evidence. The unit also works with Nebraska Internet Crimes Against Children and federal task forces to enforce local, state, and federal laws pertaining to computer crimes and cellular phones. Members of the unit receive specialized training in computer crimes, forensic computer and cellular phone analysis in a lab environment, as well as proactive criminal investigations.

Family Crimes

Under the direction of Sergeant Mark Unvert, the Family Crimes Unit investigates missing juveniles and serious crimes against children. The unit reviews reports of domestic violence and child abuse/neglect to ensure that sufficient information and evidence are gathered. Family Crimes Investigators also receive specialized training to handle investigations of incest and sex crimes involving juveniles.

The Education and Personnel Unit provides a wide variety of services related to training and human resources. Captain Genelle Moore, who commands the unit, has continued to challenge her staff to provide high quality training and a maximum amount of services for a minimal amount of expenditure.

The Narcotics Unit is an interagency task force composed of officers from the Lincoln Police Department, Lancaster County Sheriff's Office and the University of Nebraska Police Department. The Narcotics Unit works cooperatively with several other State and Federal agencies. Supervised by Captain Chris Peterson, the narcotics unit conducts investigations into drug trafficking and other drug law violations with an emphasis on mid and upper level drug dealers. A gang analyst is also assigned to the unit to track known gang populations and crimes associated with suspected gang members.




DASHBOAR DIndicators


