Mayor Gaylor Baird Comments

- 2023 summer construction season unveiled \$44 million to be invested into streets this year. There has been a total of \$220 million on streets in the last few years. This does include construction of new streets but the majority is for street repairs.
- 52 new bus stop locations to be added.
- Water system projects are in the works.

- Lincoln on the Move funds have played a major role in the funding for street repair/construction.
- Project tracking can be found on the City of Lincoln website. Type "projects" in search box.
- \$2.2 million from a grant for parking in the downtown area.
- 13th and E Clinic with a Heart and housing project was funded in part by \$2 million in grant money.
- \$1.2 million for downtown arts and entertainment upgrades.
- Upcoming City of Lincoln job fairs are on March 25th and March 30th. Search for "Summer Jobs" on the City website for more information.
- Primary election is coming up, Tuesday, April 4th remind neighbors to vote!

Neighborhood Association Grants:

- Working for a clean, healthy, and safe community. We can do this by litter prevention, waste reduction and recycling.
- KLLCB educates through classroom events and public events.
- Litter cleanup equipment available for the public.
- Neighborhood Association Grant
 - Prevent illegal dumping
 - Funding is for reimbursement of cleanup projects
 - Dumpsters, costs for trash, electronics, brush, etc.
 - Get quotes from vendor for realistic grant application
 - Receipts are required
 - Spending limits -- \$75 fuel max, \$750 tire disposal, \$250 event promotion
 - In-kind donations included use of vehicles, volunteer time.
- Community Improvement Grant
 - o Litter pickup projects- can be for groups or individuals
 - o Cleanup of generally public land such as roads, rights-of-way, alleys, and parks
 - Based on the area covered. \$50/mile for roadways, \$10/acre or combination.
 Map the area covered to be sure to maximize the project.

HazToGo – Household Hazardous waste collection site. Wednesday 9-1, summer 9-6. No appointments required.

Brush Coupons – Are available by sending KLLCB email requesting coupons. Can be handed out to the community. Offsets the cost of fees at City Transfer Station where brush is hauled to.

Tips:

- Contact a "scrapper" to bring a trailer to be filled if not enough scrap is collected to pay for a dumpster.
- Work with shredding companies, Habitat & Goodwill to recycle goods.
- Use the event as a "swap meet"; one person's trash is another person's treasure.
- Haulers will take most of the items, so the neighborhood does not have to wait for an event.
