Mayor Gaylor Baird Comments

- Lincoln on the Move passed! This round is for 8 years.
- <u>Co-responder program</u> launched to assist individuals with mental health crisis; 2 co-responders out on the street and 3rd in training; 911 can dispatch them to decrease burden on officers and de-escalate situations; when out in the field they will have jackets or hats that say co-responder, but they're not in LPD uniforms.
- Dangerous Driving Text Amendment passed by Council and in effect on April 15th (see <u>March 10 meeting minutes</u> for details).
- May 10th elections with city council seats and school board seats, reminder to vote and help shape the community.

LPD 2024 Annual Report (Chief Michon Morrow) -

- LPD has been part of CALEA (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies) since 1989. An assessment is done every 4 years evaluating their standards based on best practices nationally, passed the last one.
- Calls for service steady over last several years with a small drop in 2022/2023, partially due to shift in types calls taken (example: no longer taking barking dog calls).
- Vast majority of calls (18%) are disturbances (juvenile, domestic, regular).
- Mental health is 3.6% of all calls, but many calls may not be reflected in this number as some service calls like disturbance might not account for its cause

as mental health; believe this figure could be closer to 11% (co-responder program will help with this); working with UNL students to research mental health; would rather see individuals get the proper services rather than taking them in to protective custody which can take 72 hours to determine their release, either into the community or to a facility.

- Part I crimes record low in 2023 and beat record in 2024 (homicide, aggravated assault, rape, robbery, auto theft, all theft, burglary, arson)
 - Auto thefts are starting to decrease in 2025 (comparing 2024 to 2025,
 January dropped from 86 to 56; 108 to 67 in February; 95 to 78 in March)
 - Declining crime rates since 2005 even though the city has grown 50,000 people.
- Clearance rate reflects positive changes in the department reducing blind spots (ex: investigators being added into units); auto thefts are hard to clear because it tends to be a theft with vehicle dumped quickly
 - Rates above 100% reflect cases cleared from a past year (reporting on calendar year not fiscal)
 - Arson-primary response is by LFR with scene exploration to determine if it's arson. Once it's determined arson, LPD conducts the investigation.
- Only short 7 officers of authorized strength at the start of the year. Hiring for July training academy now.
 - Okay on recruitment and hiring with more officers getting through process with applications hovering in the 600 range (only 29 accepted showing high standards)
 - Conflict resolution skills are a priority with new recruits
 - The number of complaints to LPD have been decreasing, reflective of building relationships and de-escalation skill building
- Homicide average has stayed the same from many years (except 2017 which dropped to zero)
- Track all shooting and shots fired (accidental as well) and there was a decrease in 2024; they are mapped and show they happen across the city, not in any particular neighborhood
- In 2020 a significant decline in officers necessitated the traffic unit to be reassigned to help answer 911 calls so fewer traffic stops made;
 - 2 traffic unit officers came back in December 2024, additional planned in June; traffic unit primary focus is traffic enforcement (red light, stop sign, speeding) and are a daytime resource; goal to get back to a night shift as well by January 2026
- DUI cases have been going up since 2021 following pandemic
- Larceny from auto decreasing; 65% of the cars were unlocked
- 33% of stolen firearms last year were from vehicles (53), 87% of the vehicles were unlocked
- During quality service audits, trainees contact anyone that interacted with the department in some way

- One officer is the point person for neighborhood watch programs and has
 presented at neighborhood meetings; knowing neighbors and keeping an eye
 out is a great way to reduce crime in neighborhoods; reporting minor theft like
 packages off porches helps LPD see trends
- LPD is listening to staff, implementing their ideas; changes being made to the department to improve the environment and rebalancing to lower workloads; outside agency does promotional assessments; increasing transparency




CALLS FOR SERVICE








2024 CALLS FOR SERVICE BY TYPE






Lincoln Homicides 2024







SHOOTINGS AND SHOTS FIRED




SHOOTINGS AND SHOTS FIRED


TRAFFIC STOPS



• 530 fewer traffic stops in 2024 compared to 2023




DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE


AUTO THEFTS

- 45% UNLOCKED, 22% Keys Inside, 4% Left Running




LARCENY FROM AUTO

- 1,213 vehicles were left unlocked (65%)




STOLEN FIREARMS

- 49 of the 163 have been recovered (30%)




MENTAL HEALTH CALLS FOR SERVICE

"Applications" refers to actual applications rather than unique applicants. Some people submitted multiple applications and are represented multiple times in the total.






