Mayor Gaylor Baird Comments

- Reminder <u>Uncle Sam Jam</u> July 3rd:
 - Very excited to announce that we have a **new home** for Uncle Sam Jam this year at Haymarket Park!
 - We have been at Oak Lake Park the last few years, which was a wonderful location but posed some parking, traffic management, and security issue.
 - o Haymarket Park is a **popular venue** with plenty of seating, parking, restrooms, concessions, and a playground for kids and families.
 - The City's free Uncle Sam Jam is a festive opportunity for our community to come together and celebrate our nation's independence with a night filled with live music from Soul Dawg, fireworks, and fun.
 - o 6 p.m. ballpark opens
 - o 7:15 p.m. Soul Dawg first set
 - o 8:20 p.m. Flag lowering ceremony
 - o 8:30 p.m. Soul Dawg second set
 - o 10:00 p.m. Fireworks
 - o In addition to onsite parking, StarTran will provide free public shuttle bus service between Haymarket Park and four nearby locations.
 - o <u>lincoln.ne.gov/unclesamjam</u>
- <u>Summer reading challenge</u> underway (20% higher participation already), sign up at any library or online to participate and be eligible to win prizes (adults and kids can participate)
- <u>Splish Splash Story Time</u>: Join us for storytime at a City of Lincoln pool! We'll read, sing, and dance together (like usual), then enjoy a half hour of free swim fun. Geared for ages five and under with their adult. This program is co-sponsored by City of Lincoln Libraries

and Lincoln Parks and Recreation. Children two and under must wear a swim diaper. Children five and under must be within arm's reach of a parent or guardian. All children must be accompanied by someone 16 years of age or older.

- Family Fun Nights at the Pool \$5 whole family 6-8 pm, different pool Monday-Friday.
- Wild Wednesday Food Truck Series every other Wednesday under Rosa Parks on 6th and L streets 11am until food sells out

Central Library Proposal (Ryan Wieber)

- · See attached slides for more details.
- Downtown library (Bennet Martin) was built in three phases and not the most efficient design. The 62,000 square feet (including inaccessible basement level) is older, challenging for renovations, inefficient design for a modern library, and limited for programming space.
- Estimate of \$57 million to renovate current building, building new at Pershing site is \$70 million with underground garage for 50 stalls needing a public bond issue, only \$46.2 million to renovate the former SCC building at 1111 O Street
 - o 35% reduction in total cost for library without a levy increase
 - Solves central library replacement that has been identified for 20 years
- New building (1111 O Street) will be opened up with visibility out to street, located along bike and bus routs with ample parking in adjacent city garage, connected to skywalk, and is accessible.
- Designs shown in attached slides are conceptual and yet to be finalized with the design team which includes local firm BVH.
- Programming:
 - o First floor staffing towards the back, coffee shop, children's area, maker space lab
 - Second space adult space and study/meeting spaces
 - o Third floor a 300 seat auditorium
- Loud library where we control the noise where necessary, covered outdoor space
 - o Wood elements to help soften the space
- Books still important in this library and will be easy to find (only about 30% of checkouts digital, rest physical copies)
- Funding: Paid for through \$23 million municipal infrastructure bonds to be voted on later this year, \$5.2 million interfund loan to purchase building, \$18 million private contributions (1/3rd way to this goal)
- Timeline: <u>upcoming engagement session</u> through the early summer, City Council votes on CIP changes and bond issuance in July, Spring 2026 internal demolition begins, final designs in 2026, construction through 2028, grand opening Spring 2028
- Raised flooring planned which allows flexibility to shift cables, HVAC systems, etc.
- Name Bennett Martin isn't necessarily attached to the new facility as the old building name was a result of a generous donation for the existing building
- Coffee shop will be privately run, business yet to be selected, but looking for the right partner to compliment the library
- No plan yet for moving the library materials, companies specialize in this though
- Idea for post office drop box proposed by roundtable member; one exists at corner of existing building; another idea for aquarium
- Facilities Master Plan put together a few years ago for entire library system. This project will be spring board for all libraries in the future.

The cost to renovate and transform Bennett Martin Library into a modern library is estimated at \$57 million in 2028 dollars.

Building a new library at the Pershing site was quoted at **\$70 million**, including an underground garage with 50 stalls.
