### WHY ARE WE DOING THIS?

The City's number one community responsibility is to **KEEP RESIDENTS SAFE** 

The Salt Creek Floodplain Resiliency Study shows that there is a **HIGHER RISK OF FLOODING** in our community today than what is shown on the FEMA floodplain maps

There is increased responsibility for the City to consider additional floodplain management approaches to address this higher risk of flooding





## FAMILIES AND BUSINESSES ACROSS LINCOLN FACE DANGER DUE TO INCREASED RISK OF FLOODING

Two cars are barely visible above the flood water on Old Cheney Road near U.S. 77.





A house basement near Old Cheney and Hunts Drive is a total loss.





Water covers the parking lot at Lincoln Southwest High School on Thursday, May 7, 2015.



## FAMILIES AND BUSINESSES ACROSS LINCOLN FACE DANGER DUE TO INCREASED RISK OF FLOODING



Residents are rescued from rising flood waters in south central Lincoln. Lincoln Fire and Rescue swift water team, LPD, and Lancaster County Sheriff helped lead the evacuation of entire neighborhoods.












## FAMILIES AND BUSINESSES ACROSS LINCOLN FACE DANGER DUE TO INCREASED RISK OF FLOODING

Residents remove contaminated belongings, debris, and building materials from their homes on Huntington Ave in May 2015 after flooding caused raw sewage backups in north Lincoln.





The city confirmed 174 properties had sewer water backups during the May storm. Lincoln City Council approved a \$1 million disaster assistance fund aimed at providing some money to help affected property owners and renters pay for sewer-backup cleanup costs.



# Just 1 inch of water can cause \$25,000 of damage to your home.

To be eligible for FEMA funding for mitigation projects

To reduce flood insurance premiums for Lincoln residents by move up one or more CRS classifications



#### WHAT IS THE COMMUNITY RATING SYSTEM?



FEMA's Community Rating System (CRS) is a program that **rewards** communities for efforts they take to reduce flood risk.



The City is a participant in the CRS program and earns points for different floodplain management and mitigation activities




The City of Lincoln is a Class 5, resulting in a **25**% reduction in flood insurance premiums for all policy holders in Lincoln



# WHAT ARE THE FLOOD RISKS?

- Floodplain covers 16% of the City
- Urban flooding
- Dam/levee failure

## EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS / RESPONSE


- Emergency Action Plans

- Enhanced community engagement


## STRUCTURAL PROJECTS

  - Online survey




## **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT SCHEDULE**

# OTHER EFFORTS TO PROTECT OUR COMMUNITY

- Adopted higher floodplain regulatory standards in January 2023
- Continuing active participation in FEMA's Community Rating System
- Floodplain remapping project (100% FEMA funded)
- Feasibility study of structural & nonstructural flood
- Enhanced community engagement
