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A Message from the Chief

Dear Lincoln residents, Mayor Gaylor Baird, and Lincoln City Council members:

On behalf of all employees of the Lincoln Police Department, it's my pleasure to submit the Lincoln Police Department's Annual Report for 2020. This year marked the 150th year anniversary of the Lincoln Police Department. In 1870 the Lincoln Police Department started with four employees serving a community of 2,441 residents. Since then we've grown to over 500 employees serving a city population of 293,000. Within these pages, you'll find charts, graphs, statistics, and trends documenting the activity of the police department throughout the last year. You'll also find stories and narratives about exceptional acts of service, as well as projects that enabled our department to better serve you. While these pages are a valuable source of statistical information, no graph or chart can fully capture the dedicated service of LPD employees during this extremely challenging year.

I would like to express my deepest gratitude to Lincoln residents for their extraordinary support over the past year. In 2020, the Lincoln Police Department experienced unprecedented challenges: a global pandemic, public demonstrations and civil unrest, and a change in department leadership. However, the most devastating event was a tragedy not seen in Lincoln for over 50 years: the murder of a Lincoln police officer. As we navigated these hardships and sorrow, it was humbling to witness the outpouring of community support time and time again.

An organization's success rests on the quality of its employees. Adversity severely tested the dedication and resolve of every member of LPD in 2020, but the women and men of LPD responded with exemplary professionalism, discipline, bravery, and self-sacrifice. Our employees—your public servants—persevered through each crisis for the safety and security of all Lincoln residents.

Heroism is rarely a solitary or singular act. More often, the most powerful tapestries of heroism weave together multiple individual acts of courage and selflessness, and we are humbled to share many of these stories with you in this document. The annual report not only provides historical data collected throughout the year, but also the many accomplishments of this agency and its dedicated employees.

It has been my privilege to serve as the Acting Chief of Police for the City of Lincoln. I would like to thank the residents of Lincoln for their continued support during a uniquely challenging year. Truly, it is our honor and privilege to serve a community such as Lincoln.

Exemplary Project Transparency in Policing

In 2020, many Lincoln residents inquired about LPD's policies, procedures, community engagement, and many other important topics. In response to the volume of inquiries, Sergeant Max Hubka proposed the creation of centralized online information resource—a Transparency Hub. By adding this Transparency Hub to LPD's homepage, LPD hoped to improve trust and accountability to the members of our community and provide a single location where citizens can find answers to some of today's most common law enforcement-related questions. We want to inform and correct any inaccurate information in the public sphere, enhance public understanding of how LPD functions and reduce duplication of work when LPD personnel are answering similar questions about LPD. We will illustrate how LPD utilizes progressive and evidence-based practices differentiating our agency from the generic "police agency" and demonstrate our progressive and transparent policies and procedures.

Sergeant Hubka volunteered to research the websites of other police departments to develop an online resource accessible through LPD's webpage. He worked with numerous employees from many different units to compile the requisite information. The sections on the Transparency Hub address many questions we frequently receive about how we serve the Lincoln community, including hiring, training, use of control, community outreach, and policies. We hope this information advances ongoing community conversations, and we pledge that transparency and accountability will remain the cornerstones of our relationship with Lincoln residents.


Exemplary Project We Are Nebraska

The We Are Nebraska internship recruits University of Nebraska students from across all backgrounds. Using improvisational methods, students explore their personal stories with social impact, then present them in a theatrical experience to inspire, educate and entertain the community. Emotionally connecting and listening about other cultures, experiences, and lifestyles has the proven track record to decrease feelings of anxiety, confusion, and isolation. The topics covered include race, gender, sexual orientation, religion, cultural/socioeconomic issues, depression, addiction, civic engagement, and environmental issues.

Program Director Julie Uribe invited our officers to participate in the program with the interns as a way to grow and connect with one another. The officers met with the students on several occasions sharing stories of their lives through improvisational exercises. Everyone listened and supported each other while connecting with people different from on another. Ultimately, the officers were invited to participate in the We Are Nebraska performances at the Lied Center. Each officer shared ways they commit to being a more inclusive person. Together the students and officers created a painting that was unveiled at the show. The painting was eventually auctioned off with proceeds going to the Malone Community Center.

We are grateful that We Are Nebraska ventured outside of the box to help us connect with these incredible students. Even more, we are grateful for giving us a safe place to learn and grow so that we can better serve our community.

Just like the #1 rule in improvisation...they asked and we said "Yes, and...".




Exemplary Project COVID Response

As the scourge of the COVID-19 pandemic began to make itself known in March 2020, members of the Lincoln Police Department started debating and preparing its response. As was the case for much of the world, no one was fully prepared to combat the pandemic. The LPD administration recognized that protecting employees was of paramount concern, but this also needed to be balanced with maintaining service and protection to the citizens of Lincoln.

In those early months of the COVID-19 pandemic, members of the Lincoln Police Department worked tirelessly with representatives from the Lincoln Lancaster County Health Department and other city agencies to formulate a unified response. Captain Danny Reitan took the helm as the Lincoln Police Department's liaison with the established unified command structure in charge of the city's response to the pandemic. He worked tirelessly along with other members of the command staff, to ensure LPD employees were adequately equipped to battle this pathogen. Reitan was instrumental in developing new policies, obtaining vital personal protective equipment for officers, and keeping department personnel apprised of new developments in the battle toward immunity.

Many units were moved to remote locations including splitting up the Emergency Communications Center between two locations to limit contact between employees. Some employees were decentralized and allowed to work from home. Temperatures and COVID-19 symptoms were monitored daily. Employees were encouraged to limit contact with the public whenever possible.

The overall landscape of policing changed in many dramatic ways. The COVID-19 pandemic continues to have lasting impact on our lives. The Lincoln Police Department continues to adapt to the challenges this has brought to our department and to policing in general across this country.



Exemplary Project Less Than Lethal Transition

In 2019, Lincoln Police training staff presented the idea of transitioning shotguns already in cruisers into a less lethal option. They recognized the benefits of providing this option is to prevent or minimize encounters that are likely to injure officers and suspects alike. The idea was approved with a small group of shotguns transitioned and around 50 staff trained in their use. For around \$70, two parts help to convert the shotgun to fire small bean bag rounds.

While our department has been using the less lethal bean bag rounds for over 15 years, they were not readily available for officers in cruisers. Now, officers would have another tool available to keep themselves and others safe during potentially dangerous encounters. This platform allows officers more space between themselves and a suspect which is not possible with the use of a Taser alone. As the less lethal transition took place, we quickly saw the benefits of having them in cruisers with several successful deployments.

Due to the initial success, it was decided that all shotguns would be transitioned, and all commissioned staff would be trained in their usage. Sergeant Justin Roach and Officer PJ Lensing transitioned the remaining shotguns over the course of two months. In September, they trained all commissioned employees and certified them in the use of the less than lethal rounds.

Exemplary Project School Resource Officer Brenner

Officer Rob Brenner was a "substitute" School Resource Officer for two Lincoln Public middle schools while another officer was on leave this year. He made an incredible impact during that time. Officer Brenner emphasized relationship-building with the students at his schools.

During his morning greetings, he encountered a student who expressed a deep dislike for law enforcement every day. Officer Brenner took the time to figure out how to connect with the student, learning about their perspective, opinions, and background. After a few weeks, the student started approaching Officer Brenner and began initiating conversations, asking him about his day and his interests. In fact, the student even brought Officer Brenner a Christmas card.

After observing the growing bond between the student and Officer Brenner, a school counselor wrote, "The relationship Officer Brenner has built with the student has led to such a HUGE transformation that will forever change the student's life." Other school members sent similar accolades, saying he developed lasting connections with students and staff. A school social worker shared, "Officer Brenner goes above and beyond and doesn't stop until he feels students are safe. It is apparent that his heart has been here for the students."

Officer Brenner said that the opportunity to work as a School Resource Officer has changed both his career and life, and that the students made a lasting impact on him. Officer Brenner was nominated and chosen to receive a Mayor's Award of Excellence for the impact he made during his time as a School Resource Officer.



P.O.P Projects Problem Oriented Policing Project Spotlight

Northwest Team - Airport Hotels

Officers identified the hotels located by the airport were attracting individuals involved in narcotics sales and other related crimes. During 2020, officers focused efforts to address these concerns that included officer presence in the area, intelligence gathering, field contacts, and traffic stops. 470 hours were dedicated to this project which resulted in 46 felony arrests, 222 misdemeanor citations, and 48 warrant arrests.

Northwest Team – Narcotics on Interstate

I-80 is a major corridor for traffic traveling east and west across the United States. While thousands of motorists utilize the interstate for legitimate travel, there are some who use it for criminal purposes including the movement of large amounts of narcotics, weapons, and stolen goods. An officer focused his traffic enforcement efforts in this area to impact this problem. In 2020, 200 vehicles were contacted and several arrests were made. His efforts resulted in \$87,219, 340 pounds of raw marijuana, 79 grams of marijuana shatter, 2,612 marijuana vape cartridges, 30.5 gallons of THC syrup, 8.5 grams of THC wax, 5.5 pounds of methamphetamine, 1.8 ounces of cocaine, and 4.4 grams of heroin were seized.

Northwest Team - Garage Thefts

Thefts from open garage doors were identified as an throughout Lincoln. One officer observed several open garage doors while patrolling residential neighborhoods at overnight. In an effort to prevent thefts from these garages, the officer contacted the homeowners when finding an open garage door. This also increased the police presence in residential neighborhoods at night to deter all criminal activity. Between April and December, the officer located 200 open garage doors and contacted residents who were appreciative and thankful for the officer's actions.

P.O.P Projects

Problem Oriented Policing Project Spotlight

Northeast Team - Larceny from Auto

Officers saw a dramatic increase in larceny from auto in Lincoln. They identified a 56% increase in these crimes at a specific apartment complex development compared to the previous year. Patrol time in that area increased by 14 times compared to the year before and over 500 flyers were distributed in the areas. Social media posts were utilized to educate citizens and stress the importance of securing belongings and locking vehicles. Ultimately, the project resulted in an 80% reduction in larceny from auto offenses.

Northeast Team - 'O' Street Traffic

Speeding, excessive noise, reckless driving, engaging in speed contests (racing), littering, loitering, trespassing, j-walking, traffic accidents, traffic congestion, underage drinking, drunk driving, assault and vandalism are the most common incidents officers respond to along 'O' Street during Memorial day weekend. Several neighborhood groups had communicated their frustration with these issues as well. Officers worked with businesses along 'O' Street, notified the public through media outlets and increased their presence along 'O' Street. Through grant funding, additional officers were utilized and worked with the Nebraska State Patrol Air Wing to impact the problem. The project resulted in 204 citations, 614 warnings, 10 DUI arrests, 3 warrant arrests, 38 criminal arrests and investigated 9 traffic accidents. Officers contacted over 600 citizens through traffic stops and field contacts.

Southwest Team - Abandoned Properties

Numerous abandoned or unoccupied residences on the Southwest Team were found occupied by people who did not have permission to be there. Some of the properties were damaged after fires were set inside. Officers on the team were assigned residences to be checked twice a week and document the individuals contacted. From January to March, 73 residence checks were completed and no arrests needed to be made.

P.O.P Projects

Problem Oriented Policing Project Spotlight

Southwest Team - Intervention Strategies for Community Members

The Southwest Team identified a significant number of community members who generated a disproportionate number of calls for service. The outcome of police contacts with these individuals varied but occasionally resulted in arrests or mental health investigations. In an effort to change intervention strategies and increase successful outcomes for citizens, evidence based policing strategies were used to determine the root cause of these police interactions. Partnerships with CenterPointe, Mental Health Association, Lincoln Housing Authority, City/County Attorney Offices, and many other service agencies in Lincoln were utilized to address each individual's specific needs. An analysis of a control group of these individuals will be monitored over time to determine the success of these strategies.

Southeast Team - Larceny from Auto

The Southeast Team 3rd Shift focused efforts on reducing larcenies that happen during the nighttime hours. They spent almost 3,000 hours specifically focusing on areas where larcenies commonly occur. Using foot and bike patrol, undercover details, social media, over 1,000 flyers being distributed and increased patrols, officers were able to recover 6 stolen autos, 1 stolen gun, cleared 2 warrants and 3 broadcasts, located 40 open doors, identified 22 suspects, and made 7 arrests. They were also able to identify 17 separate instances where their efforts deterred criminal activity.

Southeast Team - Fraud Detection

Between August 2019 and August 2020, there were 180 reports of fraud where gift cards were requested as payment. Officers identified 8 local companies, totaling 47 businesses that were frequent locations where victims were asked to purchase gift cards. Officers created a flyer with information about how to identify a possible victim of fraud and distributed them to these businesses. Social media posts were made to distribute the information as well. Between August and December, there were 51 cases where gift cards were requested as a form of payment. After reviewing these cases, 8 of the cases were stopped due to a store employee intervening. The 37 cases that were not stopped originated from gift card purchases made online. The remaining 6 cases were identified as fraud by the victim and there was no loss sustained.

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P.O.P Projects

Problem Oriented Policing Project Spotlight

Southeast Team - High Accident Locations

An officer on the Southeast Team identified areas with the highest number of accidents. With assistance of other officers on the team, between June 15th and July 31st they monitored these areas, enforced traffic violations and investigated accidents. Upon completion, they compared time spent at each location and the number of accidents that occurred. Of all the locations monitored, the roundabout at 70th and Pine Lake was identified as the only location with an increase in accidents during that time. The officer shared this information with city traffic engineers and requested a study be completed. Ultimately, traffic engineers determined there was a need to change the traffic flow at the roundabout and closed the northbound outside lane and extended the lane closure to the north of the intersection.

Center Team - Gun Violence

In 2020, the downtown area saw an increase in gun and violent offenses including the murder of Timothy Montgomery. Officers identified areas with the highest number of offenses and implemented strategies to impact this issue. Officers worked with businesses to promote signage to discourage trespassing and loitering. Undercover officers, bike patrol, and traffic enforcement were utilized in the high crime areas to help mitigate problems before they escalated. Between August 14th and September 3rd, 92 traffic stops were conducted, 17 traffic citations and 96 warnings issued, 15 warrant arrests made, 38 misdemeanor citations, 5 DUI arrests, 13 narcotics arrests, and 3 seized firearms. Ultimately, officers saw a decrease in disturbances reported in the targeted areas and there were no further shootings.

Center Team - Sex Offender Compliance

Using multiple resources, an officer identified 132 registered sex offenders living in the Center Team area. The officer conducted compliance checks to ensure the information was accurate and address violations as needed. During 2020, 145 field contacts were conducted with these registered sex offenders. This resulted in 7 felony Sex Offender Registration violations, 1 Terroristic Threats and 2 Possession of a Controlled Substance violations. There were also 15 misdemeanor violations observed ranging from Assault to Unlawful Intrusion.

Year in Review

March 8

Edward Varejcka, 36, was stabbed to death in the 2200 block of Orchard. Four arrests were made in connection to his death; Makayla Fell – Aid and Abet 1st Degree Murder, Krysean Reynolds – Aid and Abet 1st Degree Murder, and Felipe Vazquez – 2nd Degree Assault.

March 15

• Timothy Montgomery, 32, was shot to death in downtown Lincoln. On March 18th, Marcus Winston was arrested for 1st Degree Murder and Nathaniel Love was arrested for Accessory to 1st Degree Murder.

March 16

• Due to a worldwide pandemic, the mayor declares a state of emergency. Directed health measures go into effect mandating sizes of gatherings, face coverings and social distancing.

May 23

 Michael Whitemagpie, 31, was shot to death in the area of 32nd and "S" Streets. Ryan Long was determined to be responsible for the murder. He was located in Jacksonville Beach, Florida on May 27th and arrested for 1st Degree Murder.

May 30

 Following the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis, hundreds gathered in Lincoln.
 Demonstrations turned violent when
 businesses were set ablaze, looted, & objects thrown at officers. This occurred over the course of four days & the mayor issued an Emergency
 Declaration implementing curfews.

Year in Review

July 4

 Gavin Hall, 20, is shot and killed by roommate, Zachariah Serna, in the 2700 block of S 40th Street. Serna was on scene when officers arrived and he was arrested for Manslaughter.

July 13

 Jeremy Lane, 38, is stabbed to death in the 1400 block of 'D' Street. The following day, Roy Wyrick is arrested for 2nd Degree Murder.

July 13

 Adolfo Aguado, 48, is shot to death by his son, Adolfo Ortiz, at his home in the 1400 block of Washington.
 Officers located Ortiz in the neighborhood shortly after they arrived. He was arrested for 2nd Degree Murder.

July 23

 Sharon Johnson, 69, is shot while riding a city bus and died from her injuries. It was determined she was shot by Joel Jones who fired from a passing vehicle. A few hours after the shooting, Jones was arrested for 2nd Degree Murder. Jarell Wheeler was arrested for Accessory to Murder.

August 26

• Investigator Mario
Herrera was shot while
serving an arrest
warrant for Felipe
Vazquez. Vazquez shot
Herrera as he was
trying to flee but was
taken into custody
later. Herrera
succumbed to his
injuries and died on
September 7th.
Vazquez was arrested

Investigator Luis 'Mario' Herrera End of Watch September 7th, 2020

On August 26, 2020, Investigator Herrera was helping serve an arrest warrant for a suspect involved in a homicide. As officers surrounded the house at North 33rd and Vine Streets, the suspect and an accomplice fled from the residence through a window. The suspect fired multiple times at officers. He was captured a short distance away, about an hour later. One of the suspect's bullets struck Investigator Herrera in the chest. For 12 days, Investigator Herrera courageously fought for his life until succumbing to his injuries on September 7, 2020. Investigator Herrera was 50 years old and faithfully served the Lincoln Police Department for 23 years. He was an immensely talented and highly decorated investigator, known for his kind, compassionate and empathetic personality. He is survived by his wife, Carrie, and four children.



Officer of the Year Officer Jay Denzin

In January of 2019, Officer Jay Denzin, an 11-year veteran of the Lincoln Police Department, ended a very successful, three-year rotation in the Lincoln/Lancaster County Drug Task Force. He bid back to the Northeast Team and hit the ground running immediately. Officer Denzin took it upon himself to become a major contributor to the Northeast Team's response to Crime Stoppers complaints. He took the knowledge and experience gained in the Narcotics Unit and began to use those same techniques to make an impact on the safety and security of Northeast Lincoln.

Over the next ten months, Officer Denzin was able to apply for and serve thirteen search warrants for narcotics. As a result of those warrants, a total of 67 felony arrests and 14 misdemeanor arrests were made. More importantly, a substantial amount of narcotics was taken off the streets. When combining the results of those thirteen warrants, the following drug amounts were seized: 292 grams (10.4 ounces) of methamphetamines, 2,527 grams (5.65 pounds) of marijuana, 1.7 grams of heroin, 107.6 grams (3.85 ounces) of THC/THC concentrate. Additionally, six firearms and \$10,054 in cash was seized from these drug dealers.

While the search warrants and subsequent arrests are the end result, there is a lot of behind-the-scenes work that must be completed to get to the point of authoring a search warrant. Hours and hours of surveillance, interviews and other investigative techniques must be completed. This work can be grueling and mundane at times and requires organization, patience and tenacity to see the cases through to the end. Jay displayed all those characteristics and was still expected to take calls for service as a 3rd shift patrol officer, making traffic stops, checking businesses and patrolling high crime areas. Proactive police officers look for opportunities to make an impact when completing those daily tasks, and Jay took full advantage of those opportunities. While working a problem property known for chronic drug use, Denzin made a traffic contact. He and another officer were able to develop a rapport with the two individuals on the traffic stop, ultimately leading the clearance of a residential burglary in which over \$15,000 in property was stolen. Officer Denzin work with other officers to develop enough information to obtain a search warrant, which yielded the arrest of three parties and the recovery of much of the stolen property.

While the productivity of Officer Denzin is impressive, his mentoring of other officers on narcotics investigations is even more impressive. He has contributed to creating a force multiplier of officer who have also demonstrated the ability to conduct drug investigations, serve search warrants and make a positive difference in the safety of Lincoln for the remainder of their careers. Officer Denzin would be the first person to read of his accolades and say the positive result was a team effort – a collaboration between the Northeast Team, other LPD teams and the Narcotics Unit. While that is true, each of these advancements made requires a leader and Jay served as that leader. The Lincoln/Lancaster County Crime Stoppers organization agreed, recognizing Officer Denzin as their 2019 Crime Stoppers Officer of the Year.

The Awards Committee recognizes the tenacious, organized and thorough approach Jay has deployed in removing narcotics and weapons from the street, as well as training other officers in his unique approach.



Field Training Officer of the Year Officer Nolan Hauser

Officer Hauser was first selected as a Field Training Officer (FTO) in 2018 and currently serves as one today. Since Officer Hauser became an FTO, he has been assigned several recruits. The responsibility of an FTO goes well beyond the normal responsibilities of a police officer and Officer Hauser accepts these challenges. Officer Hauser was described as a solid police officer, good teammate, teacher, mentor, trainer, and role model. These are essential qualities needed to be an FTO and Officer Hauser displays these with all of his recruits.

Officer Hauser employs a calm, cool, and honest training environment that helps new recruits learn the complexities of this job. He excels in training new recruits in all areas to provide them experience and repetition needed to make them a competent solo patrol officer.

Officer Hauser helps out as a role player in the academy which helps in the long term success of the recruits. He has often requested to be assigned recruits that need extra training. Officer Hauser has excelled in remedial training which assists recruits to work on deficiencies and provides a low stress environment for the new recruits. Recruits find their training with Officer Hauser to be beneficial and of high quality.

Former recruits said the following comments about Officer Hauser: he was very patient, made them feel apart of the team, very active, jumped a lot of calls, did remedial training after each call for service, was positive even when the recruit made mistakes, and was honest with the recruits regarding their performance. FTO's commented Officer Hauser was an exceptional teacher, who led by example, was exceptional at attempting to correct a recruit's problem areas, and was always positive with the recruit.

Officer Hauser has proven himself to be a reliable and dedicated Field Training Officer.

The Lincoln Police Department recognizes the hard work and dedication of Officer Hauser and acknowledges his efforts directly impact the future of the department. For these reasons, Officer Nolan Hauser was awarded the 2020 Field Training Officer of the Year.

Civilian Employee of the Year Riley Hamilton

Riley Hamilton began his service with the City of Lincoln in December 2013 when he was hired as a PC Support Specialist. Early on, he established himself as a tremendous resource for our agency and is known for his knowledge as well as his fun approach to the work environment. While he was hired as support for PC's scattered throughout our five buildings, numerous substations, and approximately 150 police cruisers, he was also leveraged for his knowledge in emerging technology such as body worn cameras as well as networking, virtual machines and serve maintenance.

Riley is a crucial part of a very small technical support staff that is ultimately responsible for connectivity and efficiencies at the Lincoln Police Department. At its most basic level, Riley's work enables officers to do their jobs better and he does his job at a very high level. Issues with aging servers, recording equipment in interview rooms and the sheer volume of tech resource needs that come with maintaining an environment that supports 500 employees around the clock fell on two people, and ultimately Riley. He continued to trouble-shoot issues as they arose, found solutions and continued to push the department further into the future, looking for efficiencies where they could be had.

Riley filled the supervisory role in exemplary fashion. In one instance, an employee was frustrated about a tech issue and treated Riley's staff unprofessionally. Riley stepped up, handled the situation, looked out for his employee and sought to remedy the problem. While he would rather work in the trenches, trouble-shooting problems and has no desire to supervise others, Riley demonstrated that he would make a fine supervisor and ultimately has the best interest of all employees at heart.

Assuming the role of a supervisor meant that Riley was essentially on call 24/7. Yet he maintained his connection with the community as he's faithfully done for the last 6 years. He takes pride in being part of what makes Lincoln a great community to live in and is the essence of while the Lincoln Police Department is such a great place to work.

Volunteer of the Year Margie Stelling

Margie Stelling is the true meaning of the word 'overcomer'. A day for Margie is quite different from a day for the majority of others. Margie was a Lincoln Police Officer for over six years. Unfortunately, her career as a police officer ended abruptly due to a traumatic car accident. The accident left Margie paralyzed and forced her into early retirement from the department. The freedom this cost Margie was...and is...unfathomable.

On October 1, 2015, Margie began volunteering at the Lincoln Police Department, despite her limitations. Her volunteer career began in the Forensics Unit, typically working six-hour shifts, two days per week. During her time in the Forensics Unit, she assisted with AFIS arrest card entries and also assisted two full-time Audio-Visual Technicians with 1,471 video evidence cases.

One of the more challenging tasks Margie took on during this time was to complete the video case backlogging, to locate vehicles, suspects and their associates for the purpose of identification for Crime Stoppers. This is an extremely tedious, time-consuming job. In 2019, Margie worked on seventy-four misdemeanor video cases. Thirty-one of these cases have been cleared with arrests, due to Margie's attention to detail.

With Margie's flexibility and her experience as an officer, she was asked to help in the Education & Personnel Unit with background checks on applicants for employment, internships, and volunteer assignments. This was a perfect fit for Margie, as she's a very quick learner with existing criminal history knowledge. Her outstanding attitude and demeanor served her well in this role as she made numerous phone calls in order to conduct the background checks.

Margie utilizes public transportation to get to the police station. This requires her to schedule her trips far in advance, which is not always timely or convenient for her. She does not let this slow her down, as she continues to be dedicated to the Lincoln Police Department and its cause.

Quality Service Audits

Since 1993, the Lincoln Police Department has been participating in a survey to gauge citizen satisfaction with the delivery of police services. The Quality Service Audit was developed in conjunction with Gallup, Inc. and it continues to be a valuable both officers tool for administrators. Officers hired after 1991 are designated as participants in the survey and receive feedback from citizens on their performance. The QSA is a telephone survey which is conducted by student interns, volunteers and recruit officers. Contact is made with citizens who have had a recent police contact, whether they are a crime victim or the recipient of a traffic ticket.





Liquor Investigations

Investigator Brian Hoefer conducts background investigations for all liquor license and keno license applications. He works directly with owners and managers of liquor licensed establishments to assist with education and licensing matters. He is the Department's liaison with various State agencies and City departments for liquor and keno licensing processes.

Planning and Research

In May 2019, the Southeast Team moved into the new Southeast Team Station / LFR Station #15 joint facility. The new station allows both agencies to respond to incidents more efficiently in the community and also establish a stronger working relationship between the two agencies.

Captain Jeff Bucher commands the Criminal Investigations Team. The team provides support and assistance to the Community Police Teams, conducts specialized investigations and coordinates follow-up investigation of major crimes. Case detectives and investigators are assigned to work with Community Police Team officers on Lincoln's most significant crimes against persons and property. Specialized investigators within the team assist with financial investigations, crimes against children, domestic assaults, firearms, and gang related crimes. The team includes an electronic evidence unit to assist with the analysis of all electronic technology. Two polygraph examiners are also assigned to the team to assist with investigations and pre-employment interviews.

The Traffic Enforcement Team is a unit of the Operations Division. The primary goal of the team is to encourage traffic safety through enforcement of Lincoln's traffic ordinances. The seven-member unit is responsible for traffic enforcement throughout the city. They also present traffic safety presentations to various community groups.

During a normal year, the Traffic Unit issues approximately 60% of the total number of speeding citations department-wide. The unit is also responsible for all of the department training regarding accident investigation, radar certification and DWI enforcement.

In the late 1970's, the Lincoln Police Department discontinued its Motorcycle Unit and debate continued for years about whether they should be reinstituted. That debate ended in 2005, when LPD made the decision to acquire motorcycles to be utilized by officers in the Traffic Enforcement Unit. Officers were certified as Police Motor Operators by Northwestern University's Certified Police Motor Officer Program. On April 18th, 2005, the motors made their maiden voyage on the city streets.

The motor officers are required to certify annually as operators and attend monthly training sessions. As the number of special events and the overall density of traffic have increased in the Capitol City, the need for maneuverability has also grown. The motorcycle officers also provide escorts at special events such as the Lincoln Marathon and the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics.

Canine Unit

For many years, canines have proven to be a valuable resource to the Lincoln Police Department. The Canine Unit was formed in the early 1960's and now consists of five canine officers and their partners. Lincoln's canines perform a variety of duties including suspect tracks, building searches, drug detection and open-area searches. In 2020, we added our first explosives detector canine, Koby, which has been a great asset to the unit. The officers and their canines work, train, and live together, which allows for a special bond to be formed between the officer and the canine. This partnership is a tremendous asset when working in our community.

Specialty Functions

SWAT Team

The Special Weapons and Tactics Team responds to high-risk situations requiring specialized tactics and coordination. The purpose of the team is to accomplish its objectives with minimal risk to officers and citizens.

Field Force

The Lincoln Police Department maintains a Field Force to provide an organized response to actual or potential disturbances caused by large groups of disorderly persons which cannot be safely resolved by standard response techniques.

Honor Guard

The Lincoln Police Department recognizes the need to maintain an Honor Guard consisting of Lincoln Police Department commissioned officers to participate in ceremonial events enhancing the image of the Department or to honor/memorialize a distinguished person or group.

Drug Recognition Experts

Drug Recognition Experts are officers who are trained to identify people whose driving is impaired by drugs. These officers must complete rigorous academic and field training to become certified. DRE Officers must also meet enhanced training and evaluation standards every two years to keep their certifications. We have seen an increase in driving under the influence of drugs making DRE's more important than ever. Our department also has additional officers who are ARIDE (Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement) trained to assist in identifying when a DRE is needed for an investigation. DRE officers also instruct ARIDE and DUI academy courses.

Marksmanship/Pistol Team

The Marksmanship Team was established to increase officer awareness of good marksmanship and provide an incentive for officers to attain their maximum potential with side arms. The team travels to compete against other law enforcement agencies across the country.

Specialty Functions

Crime Scene Technicians

Crime scene technicians have developed specific expertise in order to process major crime scenes. In today's world of technology, collecting forensic evidence is becoming more and more important to processing crime scenes. In order to maintain proficiency, the unit trains, at a minimum, nine times a year.

Accident Reconstruction Team

The team consists of a sergeant, a traffic accident reconstruction investigator, and five reconstructionists. After completing a minimum of 240 additional hours of specialized training, accident reconstructionists investigate critical injury and fatal motor vehicle collisions. The team attempts to reduce the number of traffic related deaths in the city through traffic enforcement, education, and partnering with civil authorities to evaluate and assess vehicle roadways.

Chaplaincy Corps

The Chaplaincy Corps consists of volunteers who serve as a resource to the community when requested by an officer or a citizen in time of personal or family crisis. They also provide guidance, counseling, and comfort to the police and fire personnel.

Bike Patrol


The Lincoln Police Bike Patrol began in 1988 when officers were looking for a more efficient way to patrol downtown Lincoln. The bike patrol is effective due to the mobility in a congested district that a police cruiser is not capable of. LPD's bike patrol is the oldest program in the state of its kind. Using bikes has also proven effective in projects across the city where being less conspicuous is necessary.

School Resource Officers

LPD's School Resource Officers (SROs) have been serving in Lincoln's public schools since 1971. In the spring of 2018, the City of Lincoln and Lincoln Public Schools (LPS) reached an agreement to add six SROs to serve the middle schools in addition to the six SROs already serving the high schools. As part of the new agreement, the City and LPS signed a Memorandum of Understanding that identified the goals of the SRO program and established a process for evaluating the impact of the program.

SROs are elite officers chosen through a highly competitive selection process. Candidates for the position of SRO must demonstrate not only their law enforcement aptitude, but also their ability to communicate and interact with kids, their community involvement, and their commitment to youth development. In short, those who earn the opportunity to serve as SROs are veteran officers who display a passion to serve and protect Lincoln's children. SROs receive training from the National Association of School Resource Officers, Nebraska Region V Systems of Health, and mandatory in-service training concerning deescalation, communicating with juveniles, implicit bias, cultural competency, and juvenile mental health.

SROs are trained to recognize that not every school disturbance requires enforcement action or entry into the criminal justice system. Instead, many incidents can be resolved by connecting students to resources, collaborating with school officials, or simply having a conversation with a student. LPD looks forward to continuing to positively impact the lives of LPS students.

•The Education and Personnel Unit provides a wide variety of services related to training and human resources. This includes the extensive task of recruitment and hiring of police recruits, conducting police training academies, providing in-service and elective training for veteran officers. The unit also provides crime prevention presentations and administers the Neighborhood Watch and Business Watch programs. Captain Roeder, has continued to challenge her staff to provide high quality training and a maximum amount of services for a minimal amount of expenditure.

Captain Chris Peterson

•The Narcotics Unit is an interagency task force composed of officers from the Lincoln Police Department, Lancaster County Sheriff's Office, Nebraska State Patrol, and the University of Nebraska Police Department. The Narcotics Unit works cooperatively with several other State and Federal agencies. The narcotics unit conducts investigations into drug trafficking and other drug law violations with an emphasis on mid and upper level drug dealers.





Erin Sims

 Erin Sims supervises the activities of the Forensic Unit. The unit conducts fingerprint examinations and maintains AFIS (Automated Fingerprint Identification System). In addition, members of the unit perform document examinations and maintain the department's forensic video analysis lab.

Jeff Peterson

 The Crime Analysis Unit, managed by Jeff Peterson, recognizes crime patterns by reviewing all LPD reports by analyzing the People, Patterns, Places, Problems, by using tools, techniques and other Departments to be Predictive and Preventive. The Unit also maintains the criminal intelligence information, Crime Stoppers, Pawn Information / LeadsOnLine/Stolen Items. The Unit coordinates and produces a monthly ACUDAT (Analyzing Crime Using Data About Trends) document/meeting. This is LPD's version of COMPSTAT.



Support Division

 Michele Selvage supervises the payroll and accounting activities of the department. The unit is responsible for the management of financial accounts, and the payroll for Department employees.

•Beth McQueen manages the Victim Assistance Unit. The unit provides information and support services to victims of all types of crime. The mission of the Victim Assistance Unit is to help victims navigate the criminal justice system and cope with the effects of crime. The unit utilizes extensive volunteer resources to assure that victims are provided with the information and assistance that they need.

•The Information Technology Unit is directed by Clair Lindquist. The unit develops computer applications and provides technical support to all department personnel. The department's computer-based records system is maintained by Information Services.





Emergency Communications Center

Captain Mayde McGuire manages the employees of the Emergency Communications Center who serve as a support entity for the all Lincoln/Lancaster County Emergency services. These employees are trained to handle a variety emergencies and are the point of contact for emergency, non-emergency, and data entry calls. The center received 474,599 inbound calls in 2020. The center must be staffed and operating 24 hours a day. They are responsible for dispatching Lincoln/Lancaster County police, fire, and ambulance service. The Public Safety Dispatchers provide emergency medical dispatch instructions to those involved in medical emergencies. These dispatchers routinely receive information and prioritize the response in order to send appropriate assistance to those in need.


Employees in the Public Education Committee participated in multiple community education presentations throughout the year including virtually. Operating under a Homeland Security grant, the Incident Dispatch Team provides unified command communications and support during major events. The team is one of nine that are fully deployable in the country.

To mitigate staff exposure to COVID-19 on March 16th, 2020, LECC staff began providing services with joint operations occurring at both the Primary LECC and the Back Up 911 Center. Dispatchers asked COVID screening questions to help police and fire respond in the safest manner.

Early this year, Emergency Communications Center secured a contract to upgrade its current Computer Aided Dispatch software, which will enhance operations by utilizing 'closest unit dispatching' of officers, deputies, and medical/fire.






Hour of day with the highest call volume







